SIX DOLLAR BILL FOUND BY HEIRS

Well-Preserved Little Sheet of Continental Currency Issued in 1777 is Rare Specimen

Gettysburg, Pa., Nov. 20.—Searching among the papers in the estate of Miss Kate McCreary, who died about four weeks ago, a piece of well preserved, although a little yellow paper about three by four inches, was found which at first glance was thought to be a title page torn from an old book. Examination, however, showed it to be a six-dollar bill of Continental currency, which is believed to be quite rare in these days. With the exception of one or two dates everything on the bill could be plainly read, the front side in with a lot of scroll work reading, "Six Dollars," and at the bottom, "Printed by Hall and Sellers, 1777." On the reverse was the following: "No. 7861. Six Dollars. This bill entitles the Bearer to receive Six Spanish Milled Dollars, or the value thereof, in Gold or Silver, according to a Resolution of Congress, passed at Philadelphia, May 8, 1777, Continental Currency." Efforts will be made to find out if the note is one for which a premium is offered.

WAYNESBORO GIVES \$15,000

Waynesboro, Pa., Nov. 20.—The Y. M. C. A. war fund campaign was brought to a close Sunday evening with the sum of \$15,000 raised. The amount of money pledged exceeds that by many dollars. Chairman W. L. Mannick reported the amount collected by the teams totaled \$13,369.75, leaving a balance to be raised of \$1,630.25 before going over the top. 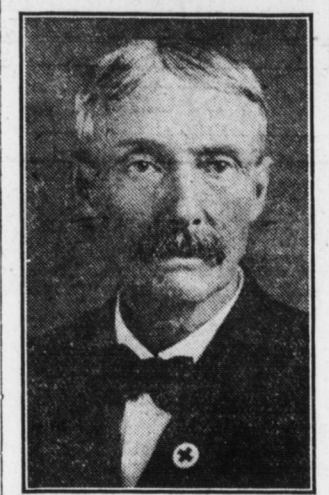

Newly-Elected Judge of Perry County Courts

Marysville, Pa., Nov. 20.—George E. Boyer, of Duncannon, was elected associate judge of Perry county. He will succeed S. W. Bornheisel, of New Bloomfield. Out of a total of a little more than 2,500 votes cast, Mr. Boyer secured a majority of about 500 over his opponent James A. Noel, of Tobyone township. Mr. Boyer is a merchant of Duncannon. He is 66 years old and has always been a Republican in politics, but he has many friends in other parties throughout the entire state. He is president of the Duncannon school board in that locality, is chairman of Hampden township in the war fund campaign and expects that district to come up with its quota. ENOLA EXCEEDS WAR FUND QUOTA

Campaign Committee Raises More Than \$400 in the Y. M. C. A. Canvass

Enola, Pa., Nov. 20.—Enola went far over its quota in the Y. M. C. A. war fund drive, according to an announcement made last night by S. G. Hepford, vice-chairman in charge of the committee from Zion Lutheran church chairman. Starting out with an assignment to raise \$250, the committee met with such success that this allotment was readily subscribed and the total to date is \$400.34. The work of raising this amount was made possible by the liberal contributions from the employees of the Enola shops and yards, who contributed \$114, and the efficient work of the committee from Zion Lutheran Church, headed by the Rev. M. S. Sharp, pastor, and H. H. Way, chairman. This committee, which included: Ellis Murray, George Erford, Charles Miller and John Adams, collected \$109.80. Pupils of the public schools also raised \$38.54. This amount was distributed as follows: High school, \$22.50; Summit street building, \$1.39; and Adams street, \$4.65. A house-to-house canvass was also made during the drive and the remainder of the money was raised in this manner. This campaign for the Y. M. C. A. funds is the second within a month that the citizens of Enola have volunteered their allotment. In the last Liberty Loan campaign the quota was more than tripled.

Deserted Wife Petitions For Husband's Property

Sunbury, Pa., Nov. 20.—Mrs. David McDonald, wife of a former Mount Carmel constable who suddenly left home in July, 1913, leaving a wife and seven children, to-day petitioned the court to set aside a portion of his property for their keep. According to the petition he has \$500 due him from Northumberland county in constable's fees, a legacy of \$200, and a sixth interest in a vacant lot in Mount Carmel. The petition also declares that the children are suffering from lack of proper food and clothing. Mrs. McDonald asserts that they were married on October 18, 1897, and that on July 1, 1917, he left her without cause. He was once seen at El Paso, Texas, she says, but does not now know his whereabouts.

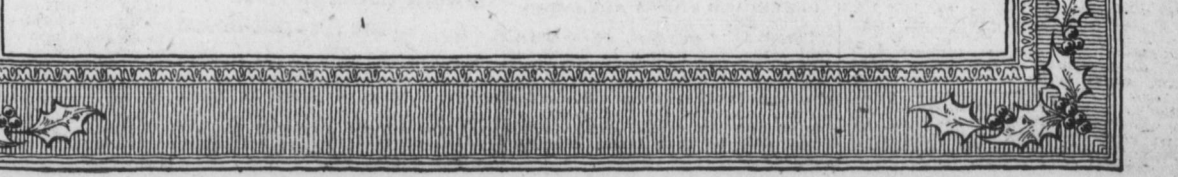
