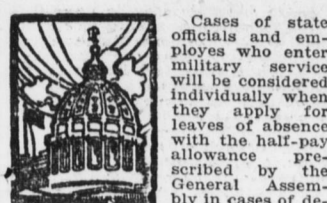


SEPARATE CASES FOR ABSENCES

PENNSY PLANS ANOTHER MERGER

Takes in All Lines West of Pittsburgh; Directors to Act Later

Philadelphia, Nov. 22.—Samuel Rea, president of the Pennsylvania Railroad Company, answering the published rumors...

The lines marked for immediate merging are the Pittsburgh, Fort Wayne and Chicago Railway, the Cleveland and Pittsburgh Railway, the Erie and Pittsburgh Railroad, and other roads now entirely owned and operated by the Pennsylvania Company.

Consolidation of the subsidiary lines has been taking place for several years in the effort of the railroad company to bring the relationship of controlled companies closer to the operating head of the system.

The Pennsylvania Railroad has 115 separate roads embraced in its system...

In Line With Policy.—The acquisition of the Pennsylvania Company, which the directors are considering, is in line with our policy of eliminating unnecessary corporations and duplicate operating and financing.

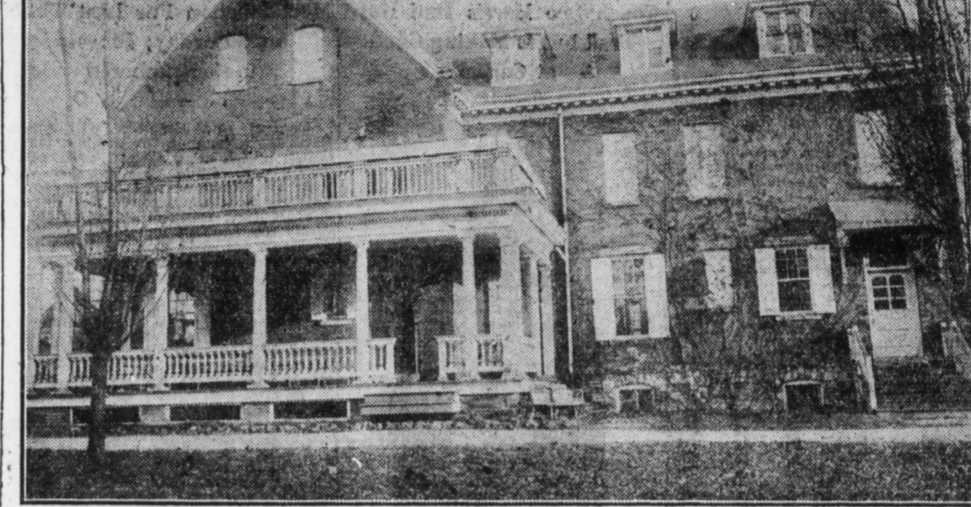
