PLAN PATRIOTIC PROGRAM FOR RUTHERFORD Y. M. C. A.; TO HONOR SOLDIER BOYS



C. H. DRESHMAN, State Secretary, to Make Address on Army Work at Rutherford Y. M. C. Plans have been completed for a record-breaking demonstration to be held at Rutherford Y. M. C. A. It will be held Tuesday night, November 27, starting at 8 o'clock, and will be in honor of the men who have enlisted in the Army from the Rutherford yards and vicinity. Parents, relatives and friends of the soldiers have been invited and it is expected the attendance will reach 1,200.

An elaborate program has been prepared, in which soldiers from the Middletown Aviation Corps, soldiers who have been in the training camps and men who have been in touch with the Y. M. C. A. work in the Army at the front will take part. Three important features of the program will be music by a 15-piece orchestra, singing by the Rutherford Y. M. C. A. Glee Club and patriotic characterizations by the following: Uncle Sam, Grouver Booser; Goddess of Liberty, Miss Catharine Shull; American soldier, Alton Snyder, and Red Cross, Mrs. Russel Stoner. In addition to this, the honor roll will be displayed, together with a service flag with thirty-two stars. C. H. Dreshman to Speak C. H. Dreshman, one of the Pennsylvania state secretaries, will address the big audience. Mr. Dreshman for the past several months has been visiting the camps throughout the country and has been in close touch with the great work that is being prosecuted. He has a thrilling story to tell of the soldier life and has been addressing large mass meetings in the huts of the camps with tremendously good results.

Enola Yardmasters to Start Eight-Hour Shifts; Another Clerical Shakeup

Enola, Pa., Nov. 23.—Yardmasters in the local yards will go on eight-hour shifts beginning Sunday. As a result of this change one assistant yardmaster will go on one of the new tricks and another clerk will be promoted to a dispatcher. The new yardmasters will be: Philip Rothman, who will work from 7 until 3; C. Landis Snyder, from 3 until 11, and William S. Hamill, from 11 to 7. William D. Corle will go on the 11 to 7. trick at the East End dispatcher's office with the title of assistant yardmaster. On the first of October the company granted eight-hour shifts to the assistant yardmasters and a number of promotions were made in the clerical forces. The new shifting of men will necessitate another shakeup in the clerical department. It is also believed that the railroad company will grant eight hours to the other clerks within a short time.

ADULTS MUST GET YARN Announcement was made this morning by the local Red Cross Chapter that yarn for knitting will not be given to children unless they are accompanied by some responsible person. This ruling was put into effect as the result of many children coming into the headquarters, 206 Walnut street, asking for

CRIMES GONE WITH SALOONS Greenville, Ala.—A striking contrast is found in the reports of the grand jury of Butler County during the saloon regime and those under the present prohibition rule. The grand jury for the fall term this year shows only nine indictments returned, compared with 225 found at one sitting during the licensed saloon days. In former days the criminal docket was seldom cleared under two weeks; this year it will be cleared in three days. Only six prisoners are confined in the Butler County jail.
