LITTLE CANDY FOR CHRISTMAS

West Shore Sunday Schools Plan to Cut Out Gifts This Year

Abolition of the long-used custom of giving candy for a Christmas treat in West Shore Sunday schools has taken place in several of the schools and it is likely it will be adopted generally along the West Shore.

The first school to announce the plan of abolishing this idea is the Camp Hill Methodist Church. The Rev. J. E. Breneman, pastor of the church, said yesterday that the Sunday school board had voted to wipe out the treat and use the money to buy food and clothing for the needy.

In several churches it had been decided to treat this year as in other years, but it is likely this will be reconsidered when it is known that many West Shore schools have adopted the plan.

Children who have heard of the plan in advance are favoring it and are not at all disappointed over the change. The scarcity of sugar has prompted leaders to take this step.
