SHEEP MAKE GAIN IN PENNSYLVANIA

Interesting Comments Made By State Officials on the **Livestock Reports**



Officials of the State Department of Agriculture who have been studying the reports made by crop and stock reporters in the hundreds of townships in the state say that sheep will show an increase of from 20,000 to 25,000 head, horses will not decline in number nearly as much as feared and that there will be fewer hogs at the end of the year than at the beginning. These reports are based on information obtained at first hand from farmers and are used in making up the statistics.

Many purchases have been made in other states and farmers have kept the ewes. The fears regarding decline of the number of horses have not materialized, as farmers appear to have refused attractive prices offered and there has been more attention given to breeding. The officials here comment upon the fact that horses have apparently not decreased in spite of the growth of motor vehicle use on farms and in rural districts.
