RED CROSS WANTS 4,000 MEMBERS

Columbia Chapter Plans Big Mass Meeting and Canteen to Enroll Number

Columbia, Pa., Dec. 3.—Columbia Chapter of the Red Cross has named S. High Levan, a prominent merchant, miller and bank director, as director of the membership bureau to conduct the drive for membership which opens the week of December 17. Director Levan has appointed the following as his board of advisers to assist in the campaign: H. M. North, Jr., who will have charge of the speakers; William H. Lucas, president of the Merchants and Manufacturers' Association; the Rev. G. W. Brown, pastor of St. Peter's Roman Catholic parish; Alfred C. Bruner, James A. Meyers, president of the Columbia Water Company; Mrs. B. C. Shannon, vice-chairman of Columbia Chapter; Mrs. George A. Shilow, of the membership bureau; and A. L. Campbell, secretary of the Merchants and Manufacturers' Association, who is director of the bureau of publicity. Mrs. H. M. North, Jr., is an ex-officio member, being president of Columbia Chapter. It is proposed to have a monster mass meeting to open the campaign and there will be a door-to-door canvass to obtain four thousand new members for the chapter. A meeting will be held in the State Armory next Monday evening at which ten former team captains and the representatives of all the auxiliaries and branches will be present. Ministers of the various churches will be asked to deliver sermons on Red Cross work on Sunday, December 16, the day preceding the start of the membership drive.

Cumberland Co. Institute Opens at Carlisle Today

Carlisle, Pa., Dec. 3.—Carlisle was today the mecca for scores of teachers in the schools of Cumberland county, who came here to attend the opening session of the sixty-seventh annual teachers' institute. Judge S. B. Sadler welcomed the teachers to Carlisle. Several features will mark the session this week, among them being the beginning of a drive to secure 5,000 new members for the Carlisle Chapter of the Red Cross and special intensive sessions for instructors in various grades. Among the prominent educators who will make addresses at the various sessions are Dr. Francis H. Green, of the English department of the West Chester Normal School; Dr. George D. Tapp, of Gray's Mills, Ind., head of the department of education of Washburn College; Prof. T. L. Gibson, of Baltimore; Dr. Ezra Lehman, president of the Cumberland Valley Normal School; Dr. James H. Morgan, head of Dickinson College, and others.

The bride is a talented musician and both she and Mr. Clark were graduated from the Mechanicsburg High School in the class of 1914. Mr. Clark, who is the son of Mr. and Mrs. C. G. Clark, West Keller street, was employed at the Elliott-Fisher Type-writing Works, near Harrisburg. He is the son of a prominent farmer, who joins the Aviation Corps as a tool-maker.

Food and Fuel Shortage Causes Inconvenience

Dillsburg, Pa., Dec. 3.—Food and fuel shortage, while not serious here, is causing considerable inconvenience. There have been constant shipments of sugar, but not sufficient to meet the demands. The shipments of coal are not equal to the requirements at this time, but no entering of coal is known. The local baker has had flour sufficient but for want of sugar has not been able to meet the demands for cakes.

DAVID M. MUMMA BURIED Mechanicsburg, Pa., Dec. 3.—Funeral services for David M. Mumma, a well-known resident of Hampden township, were held today at his home. He was aged 67 years and earlier in life was engaged in farming, but of late years was in the employ of the Bethlehem Steel Company at Steelton. Miss Martha F. Eberly Dies at Harrisburg Hospital

Mechanicsburg, Pa., Dec. 3.—Miss Martha Fitcher Eberly died late Saturday afternoon at the Harrisburg Hospital, where she was taken several days before for examination and treatment for stomach trouble. She was a member of one of the prominent Cumberland county families, being a daughter of the late Joseph Eberly, of Hampden township. She was aged 63 years and was a member of the Methodist Episcopal Church. Miss Eberly spent the greater part of her life in Mechanicsburg, where she lived with her sister, Mrs. W. L. Singiser, in East Main street. Two sisters and one brother survive, as follows: Mrs. Singiser, of Milton; Mrs. Mumma, of Silver Spring township; and T. C. Eberly, of Joplin, Mo. At this time no definite funeral arrangements are made.

CONTEMPLATED SUICIDE Waynesboro, Pa., Dec. 3.—It was known today that Harry Ralph Funk, the seaman in the United States Navy, who committed suicide at the home of his parents here Friday afternoon, had told a few of his friends that he intended doing so, as he did not want to go back in the marine service. He had overstayed the time of his furlough and this also made him feel all the more despondent. Before he fired the two bullets into his mouth he tested out the revolver by firing a bullet into the floor of his home, to see if the weapon was in good working order. Coroner Kinter, of Chambersburg, investigated the cause of the suicide after learning the particulars deemed an inquest unnecessary.

PRESSMAN LEAVES Waynesboro, Pa., Dec. 3.—Charles H. Ripper, for the past twelve years a pressman on the Daily Record here has resigned his position and left on Saturday for Harrisburg, where he has accepted a similar position in the State Printing office.

Ask Dissolution of Theater Ownership

Carlisle, Pa., Dec. 3.—An equity action has been begun by George E. Lloyd and A. M. Bowman, attorneys for M. M. Lindsey, of Mechanicsburg, against Benjamin Joffe of that town. The dissolution of the Carlisle Paramount Theater Company in Mechanicsburg, the placing of the business in the hands of a receiver, an accounting of the business and general relief. In the statement it is alleged that Lindsey furnished the money for the business, which is accepted by Joffe. Lindsey claims that the money is claimed to have been unnecessarily wasted and extravagant and to have frequently drawn heavily from the partnership account.

Millfin County Mountains Full of Deer Hunters

Lewistown, Pa., Dec. 3.—Deer and bear hunters to the number of several hundred have taken up camp in the Seven Mountain region where they will remain until the close of the season, Saturday, December 15. Hunting parties from Lewistown, Burnham, Yeagertown, Redsville and Milroy and other parts are camped in the mountains. A Lewistown party is at Red Cap Roost in the Big Kettle. Yeagertown party is at Camp Hi-Power near the "Paw" Garry estate, and three parties from Burnham are camped in Tremont Valley. A large number of individual hunters are on the trail. Only one deer may be shot by an individual during the season and not more than six by any one camp. This year 3,247 hunting licenses have been issued in the county against 2,222 last season. The first deer of the season killed was one near the Big Kettle, in the Seven Mountains on Saturday morning, by one of a party of hunters from Milroy under the leadership of Forester William Aurand.
