Items of Interest

Henry Ford informed friends at the Detroit Motor Club in Detroit the other day that he had just notified France that that country could have 12,000 Ford tractors. He is now working on from 7,000 to 7,500 for England, and all of these will be delivered before America's demand is met. Mr. Ford said that he is taking advantage of the present fine weather in making the tests, and that in a short time, several of these tractors would be moved to the South for test work there. He laughingly said that he was 64 years old, but believed that in his present condition he was capable of running farther and running faster than any other old man in Detroit. As indicating the work he is doing, he told of rising at 6 o'clock, Wednesday morning, and of following eleven tractors over the fields. He rode on many of these, and at the close of the morning's test, knew everything that was to be known regarding the work of each tractor and that all of his tractors were being fitted to create their own light for night work. The other night a test was made with one of the tractors, as it plowed an acre in sixty-five minutes. Mr. Ford said that it was evidence that the government action with regard to the manufacturing of automobiles was in line with saving policy and that it was probable the government did not care to have the manufacturers make too many cars, as too many cars means the consumption of precious gasoline.

School of Commerce Shows Development

School of Commerce established 1894, now oldest and largest in Central Pennsylvania, successfully conducted since 1907 under the personal supervision of D. L. M. Raker. In August the Harrisburg Business College was purchased and merged into the School of Commerce and Professor J. E. Garner, the oldest and one of the best-known educators in Harrisburg, is now assisting in one of its departments. The enrollment books show over 500 students, consisting of normal, high school, teachers, college people, and people of leisure and wealth. Two years ago its various departments, equipment, teachers, courses of study and methods were examined by a national committee on education and it was pronounced a standard school and was admitted to the National Association of Accredited Commercial Schools of United States and Canada. It is Mr. Raker's aim to keep fully in touch with every important development in modern office devices and methods.

The new stenotype machine was introduced five years ago for those students who desire greater speed and easier method of taking dictation. Ten teachers are employed and are specialists as heads of their department, which leaves each department with the latest word in efficiency. Every graduate receives a diploma from the school and a pocket certificate from the N. A. C. S. which gives membership in the employment department of any accredited school in the country. Class and individual instruction are given and the student may enter at any time of the year, any Monday, and pursue the course as rapidly as their ability will permit them, regardless of what others are doing. School of Commerce students hold responsible positions in prominent offices and business corporations of Harrisburg and many other cities throughout the United States government departments. Many have gone to Washington within the past two months at beginning salaries of \$1,000 or \$1,200 a year. Fourteen others will leave this month at \$1,100 or \$1,200 a year with a bonus of 10 per cent. Many ambitious students are working unusually well, making special attempts to finish in a short time. One girl finished the stenographic course in four and one-half months, the champion record, finishing all branches with exceptionally high marks. Courses of study consist of Bookkeeping or Business Course, which comprises bookkeeping and accounting, commercial law, commercial arithmetic, penmanship, rapid calculation, business English, punctuation and corresponding and spelling; Shorthand courses, typewriting, letter writing, spelling and office training; Stenotype courses consist of the above and the same subjects, only substituting stenotype for shorthand. The school is centrally located, taking the entire third floor and half of the fourth floor of the Troup Building, Market Square; well lighted and ventilated rooms.
