Antonesco, the Rumanian minister here, has issued the following statement concerning the situation on the Rumanian front: "The armistice was simply a measure of military order imposed on us through the Rumanian front being entirely enclosed within the Russian front, it would be a mistake to make a political deduction from it. Rumania intends to remain faithful to her alliances and to work until the end with the allies."

MOTTERN SAVED FROM THE CHAIR

Board of Pardons Recommends Commutation in Long Drawn Out Case

The long battle to save Henry Ward Mottern, youthful Jefferson

chair, ended last night when the State Board of Pardons announced that it had recommended commutation of his death sentence to life imprisonment. The recommendation will go to the Governor next week and will be approved. Attorney General Francis Shunk Brown, speaking for members of the board, said that since Earnest Haines, companion of Mottern in the slaying of Haines father, had been acquitted the board felt that it could do nothing else. "The two cases were inextricably bound up. Haines was awarded a new trial and acquitted. We thought that Mottern was therefore entitled to commutation," said he.

Few cases have attracted the attention of the two Jefferson county boys. Their conviction was followed by pronounced sentiment being expressed all over the state to save them from the chair and a revulsion of feeling occurred in Jefferson county which resulted in Haines, after being refused elemency by the board, being acquitted. Mottern has the record for being respited. Sentenced to electrocution in January of this year after being refused commutation and a rehearing he was seven times granted respite, the last time only a few weeks ago. He was twice denied rehearing and finally granted another chance in September. Since October his case has been under advisement.

During the pendency of the cases of the two boys there was an unsuccessful effort to abolish the death penalty in the Legislature.

The board granted the pardon for George A. Redsecker, formerly of Elizabethtown, who figured in ten indictments growing out of forgeries and who was sentenced to from three to six years in prison in the fall of 1915.

The board granted short shrift of the application of L. L. Parry, convicted of illegal practice of medicine in Pittsburgh and against whose pardon the State Bureau of Medical Education and Licensure protested. When the case came up Secretary of the Commonwealth Woods said that it was a waste of time because Parry did not promise not to engage in the practice again and Licentenny: Frank Pardons recommended — W

did not promise not to engage in the practice again and Lieutenant Governor McClain denounced the application.
