Dealers are anxious to avoid shipping but were not very optimistic to-day on account of the cold weather tying up the railroads. So uncertain is the situation that dealers have refused to take orders. As soon as shipments arrive they are delivered to those who place their orders on the day they are made. For a time orders were booked for weeks ahead and it was impossible for dealers to supply coal for families who had no coal.
