SIX MONTHS DOG MAKES TROUBLES

Cause of Much Letter Writing Among People at the State Capitol These Days



Dogs under six months appear to be giving officials of several departments of the state government considerable trouble to do these days. The new state dog license code became effective on Tuesday and provides that every dog above the age of six months in third-class cities, boroughs and townships must be licensed and that after dark they must be penned up or taken on a leash.

Dogs under six months are not to be licensed, but as they are prone to roam about many letters have come here asking what to do with them if captured and owners do not arrange for their liberation. By the terms of the code unlicensed dogs not called for are to be shot or destroyed.

The operation of the new dog license act has been brought to attention of State Game Commission officers and wardens have been instructed to use care in shooting licensed dogs and to pen up the animals under six months old.

Inmates Do Well.—Inmates of the Danville State Hospital, who were organized into an auxiliary of the Red Cross, have contributed almost 45,000 separate articles since organized last May, according to a letter received by Governor Brumbaugh from the institution. The Governor issued a suggestion that people in state institutions should knit for the soldiers and at Danville there have been made 127 sweaters, 186 pairs of socks, 30 pairs of wristlets, 12 helmets and 9 scarfs. The inmates have also made bathrobes, surgeons' gowns, bed shirts and thousands of surgical gauze dressings.

Chester Case.—The Public Service Commission has scheduled its first hearing for Chester. It will be held Thursday, and will relate to the complaints that railroads have closed avenues in Essington. Hearings are to be held in this city and Lebanon and other complaints next week.

CHRISTMAS SEALS SOLD WELL HERE

Nearly Five Thousand Dollars Received, With Some Returns Out

The result of the Red Cross Christmas seals campaign was made known last night by D. D. Hammelbaugh, chairman of the schools committee, showing that \$4,922 has been received thus far, with five county districts to be heard from. The greatest sale for any one school building was that of Cameron, with \$9,471, or 62 per pupil. The most enterprising girl in Harrisburg with the seals was Evelyn Mair, Susquehanna, who disposed of 10,951. Dickson Johnson, Camp Curtin, triumphed over all boy contestants, yet he was below Miss Mair. His record was 8,500.

British War Nurse Tells of German Prison Camps

MRS. EYLA HASTINGS.
Mrs. Eyla Hastings, whose husband was killed while serving as a lieutenant in the British Army in the battle of Loos, is visiting in Chicago. Mrs. Hastings served as a nurse in the Fourth London General Hospital. In speaking of her experiences she said:
'I have seen great big husky "Tommy's" just exchanged from German prison camps carried fighting in the delirium into padded cells, incurably insane because of their unbelievable torture experienced while German prisoners.'
