It is doubtful whether the Governor will have his desire of seeing E. E. Dorsett confirmed as chairman of the commission if that is refused the commission may be "birehced."

sembly and the disappearance of any immediate hope of reconciling the striving political parties public attention in North Russia is centered on the bread shortage, the lack of virtually all foodstuffs, the breakdown of transportation and the commercial stagnation as the result of the closing of the banks. Moscow, Petrograd and all the larger cities of North Russia have little bread. The bread allowance in Petrograd to-day has been reduced to a quarter of a pound daily and the food commission has limited eggs to children under three years, each child to have four eggs a month. But eggs are not obtainable at any price. The commission also has limited fresh meat to small children and potatoes have been substituted for bread at many places in North Russia.

A general suspension of passenger trains began to-day in an effort to speed the transportation of foodstuffs from Siberia, and South Russia to the north, but traffic is hindered by the masses of wandering soldiers from all sections of the country who insist their trains have precedence over freight. Usually all trains arriving at Petrograd are crowded with soldiers.

Withdrawals on checks are limited to 500 rubles to depositors daily and long lines form at the banks because of the long delays and difficulty in getting money. Bolshevik agents are reported opening safe deposit boxes and confiscating hoarded gold and silver for the government and turning hoarded paper money into current accounts for the owners.

Street cars and lighting plants have suspended operations frequently in Petrograd and Moscow because of the lack of fuel. Dispatches from many points in the Samara and Moscow districts report starvation conditions. Thousands marched yesterday in a peaceful demonstration following the funeral services for M. Logvinov, a Siberian member of the constituent assembly and the other victims of last Friday's demonstration. The city was quiet during the day, the holiday anniversary of "Bloody Sunday," January 9, 1905.

Peace Agitation Receives Marked Attention From All Parties in Germany

By Associated Press London, Jan. 23.—M. Karakha, secretary of the Russian delegation at Brest-Litovsk, has announced, says an Exchange Telegraph dispatch from Petrograd, that the Russian delegation has made an official protest to Dr. Von Kuehlmann and Count Czernin, heads of the German and Austrian delegations regarding the omission from the official German reports of the declaration of Leon Trotsky at the latest sitting of the peace conference respecting the attitude of the central powers. M. Trotsky said that after a fortnight's negotiations Germany and Austria were insisting upon terms contrary to the principles they acknowledged in their announcement of December 25 respecting peace without annexations or indemnities.

Russian Delegation Makes Official Protest to Berlin Touching Peace Parley

London, Jan. 23.—The peace agitation in Austria-Hungary is receiving a great deal of attention in Germany. The Socialist newspaper Vorwarts, of Berlin, emphatically declares the solidarity of the German proletarians with the Austrian proletarians in the peace struggle, and maintains

that events in the dual monarchy must have a deep reaction in Germany. "We have been walking on the edge of a precipice in the last few days," it says, and goes on to demand that the German government resolutely take its place by the side of its Austrian ally.

"As the fruit of pan-German propaganda," it continues, "we are menaced not only with the wrecking of the peace negotiations with Russia, but also with complete political isolation. This danger can be averted only if the German government declares itself in agreement with Foreign Minister Czernin's declaration respecting adherence to the principles of no annexations and no indemnities, and draws therefrom all practical conclusions, which must be drawn honestly. If the government acts otherwise the consequence would be that, while Austria-Hungary and Russia enter into lasting relations of friendship, Germany will remain excluded therefrom and we shall lose our last neighbor and friend."

The British labor party opens its annual conference at Nottingham to-day. Labor's attitude toward the carrying on of the war and toward peace will be discussed. The food situation in England which has resulted in the ordering of two meatless days a week by the food controller is expected to be the subject of several resolutions.
