GETTYSBURG TAX RATE INCREASED

New Figures Will Provide For Running Expenses and Pay Debt

Gettysburg, Pa., Jan. 24.—Council has raised the tax rate for borough purposes one and one-half mills. Following careful consideration of this subject by the newly-appointed finance committee, who went over the figures in detail in preparing the budget for the coming year, this was considered an absolute necessity. One-half mill is added to the general fund and one mill to the special fund. It is thought that this rate will cover all the running expenses of the borough for the year, while the new rate in the special fund will meet all the purposes for which it is intended, as well as pay back the \$510 which was borrowed during the past year because of insufficient taxes.

Newport Band May Strike "German" From Name

Newport, Pa., Jan. 24.—The Newport Germania band is being reorganized, but the name that the reorganized organization shall bear is the subject of more or less controversy. The name Germania smacks "too much of Hohenzollernism" in the minds of some, and as a result of all this it is quite likely that the name of the organization will be changed. J. S. Byer, Representative of Perry county in the State Legislature and president of the band, said that for some time the change of name had been under discussion by officials. A statement concerning the organization and naming of the band has been made public as follows: The reason the word "Germania" was adopted is this: During the Civil War a large number of the members enlisted, and the band ceased to exist. After the close of the war, when it was again organized, mostly by veterans of the Civil War, they had for a musical director, a leader of German descent, and as German bands were usually very good bands, they adopted the name as a sort of compliment to their musical director.
