Va., and that Mrs. Wade received a letter from her son, in which he is reported to have said he was leaving Hagerstown and requesting her to hold the trunk. Wade, it is known, had resigned his position at a local factory, where he had been employed. Miss Helen Dunn, niece of Mrs. Boyer, at the coroner's request, testified that Wade, on the night of the tragedy, had gone upstairs to get a last Saturday night, information said tragedy, had gone upstairs to get a suitcase when Mr. Boyer unexpect-edly returned home.
