

Test Will Come in the House on Dictatorial Control of Nation's Food

Washington, Jan. 29.—There is going to be a showdown in the House on the granting of further unlimited powers to the President. The matter was brought squarely to a head in an exchange of views between Herbert C. Hoover, food administrator, and Representative Sydney Anderson, Republican, of Minneapolis, authority in the House on food conservation legislation.

Further food conservation legislation shall be specific rather than general. Mr. Hoover in turn has insisted that general powers shall be assigned to the President, to be delegated to Mr. Hoover for the production, distribution and restriction of rationing a public eating places.

New U-Boat Decree Handed to Lansing

Washington, Jan. 29.—The first definite information as to the scope of the German government's extension of the submarine blockade was made known late yesterday afternoon when Secretary Lansing gave for publication the text of the decree extending submarine operations to Azores and Cape Verde islands.

The decree bears date of January 25, 1918, and is described as a supplementary to the decree of January 21, 1917. It establishes two very large barrier areas in the North Atlantic Ocean. One is around the Cape Verde Islands off the Senegalese coast of Africa. The other extends from the Madeira and Azores Islands and includes both those groups.

ALL NEWS OF THE RAILROADS

READING HAS NEW SUPERINTENDENT

Isaac T. Tyson Succeeds W. F. Eckert on Reading Division; Change Places

Effective at midnight last night Isaac T. Tyson became superintendent of the Reading division of the Philadelphia and Reading. He was formerly superintendent of the Reading and Columbia divisions, succeeding W. F. Eckert, who takes Mr. Tyson's place, exchanging positions.

Mr. Tyson was born on February 28, 1867, at Philadelphia, and was educated in the public schools. He began railway work on November 4, 1884, on the Reading as assistant to the agent at Neshaminy Falls, and the following May became an extra operator. He then served consecutively as operator, extra agent and extra dispatcher, and from July to November, 1889, as agent and dispatcher on the Philadelphia and Seashore.

He becomes yardmaster in November, 1889, on the Reading. The following April he was promoted to general yardmaster, remaining in that position until July, 1892, when he was appointed assistant yardmaster. From August, 1893, to August, 1899, he served as yardmaster and then as assistant trainmaster, until his appointment as superintendent of the Reading and Columbia division.

A large attendance of wives and sisters of railroad employees of the Pennsylvania Railroad is expected to-morrow afternoon at the P. R. R. Y. M. C. A. special program for their benefit has been arranged by the Women's War Relief Division.

Heads of railroads in the east have been ordered by the national railroad administration to call out miners in the coal regions to help in clearing snow from tracks and yards in order to facilitate freight traffic.

Forty miles of track on the Berlin, Salisbury and Boswell branches of the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad, which have been blocked with snow for almost a week, were cleared today by more than 1,000 coal miners who rallied to a call issued by the Somerset Coal Operators' Association. The miners were assisted by several hundred men furnished by the railroad company.

To aid in breaking the coal blockade, the Reading Coal and Iron Company today suspended operation at four of its largest collieries in the Shamokin-Mount Carmel district and assigned 900 laborers to the Reading Railway Company to aid in releasing long trains of coal from snow and ice bound sidings.

Charles F. Miller, a Pennsylvania Railroad brakeman, is off duty on account of illness.

Reports from the Philadelphia and Reading Railway officials to-day were more encouraging. Trains are being moved more frequently and on better schedule time.

Railroad men report that they frequently find dead rabbits along the road and they evidently died from the intense cold, lack of food and the deep snow. Some of them were frozen stiff.

The Reading Railway Company is not booking a single excursion for the season of 1918. As a rule these bookings started late in the fall. The reason that they have been held up is because of the uncertainty of the company being able to furnish the necessary equipment due to the war.

Penny Officials Tell of Further Train Service

Philadelphia, Jan. 30.—Railroads of Pennsylvania emerged to-day from the deep caused by Sunday night's heavy snowstorm. Freight movement from Pittsburgh east is in operation with short trains and bituminous coal moved eastward.

The Pennsylvania railroad officials said 25,000 men were kept busy all day clearing tracks and sidings east of Pittsburgh and between here and Washington. There were 12,000 at work on the main line to Pittsburgh alone. One track on the crest of the Alleghenies where snow drifts were 18 feet deep, is still closed.

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
