Licensing of All Small Bakers Is Now Ordered

Washington, Feb. 1.—President vilson yesterday by proclamation, Washington, Feb. 1.—President Wilson yesterday by proclamation, ordered that all persons, firms, corporations and associations manufacturing bread in any form, cake, crackers, biscuits, pastry or other bakery products must procure licenses on or before February 4, excepting those already licensed and those whose consumption of flour and meal is less than three barrels a month. The order includes hotels, restaurants, public eating places and clubs which serve broad or bakery products of their own baking.

The proclamation also orders that persons, firms, corporations and associations engaged in importing or distributing green coffee also must procure licenses on or before February 4. All applications for licenses are to be made to the United States food administration. Violations are punishable by a penalty prescribed by Congress in the food conservation act.


