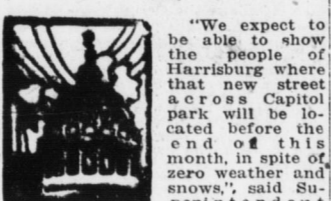
C. C. Green was appointed to prepare an outline of work that should be accomplished by Junior Red Cross workers in the public schools.

BADGES FOR REJECTED MEN Senate Passes Bill Authorizing Secretary of War to Provide Them Washington, Feb. 6.—The Administration bill authorizing the Secretary of War to provide distinctive badges to men of draft age who have been exempted or rejected, was passed yesterday by the Senate.

Another measure passed provides for the reorganization of the Army Engineers' Corps. Under the bill the corps will be composed of seven regiments and two mounted battalions, with a brigadier general, twenty-three colonels, thirty lieutenant colonels, seventy-two majors and one hundred and fifty-two captains.

The Senate also passed Senator Chamberlain's bill, making a felony the purchase from soldiers or sailors of any military equipment.

NEW RECTOR CHOSEN Carlisle, Pa., Feb. 6.—The Rev. Harry D. Veitz, of St. Peter's Church, Philadelphia, has been unanimously elected to the vacant rectorship of St. John's Episcopal Church, by the vestry. The call is issued to be effective at once. He will succeed the Rev. Alexander McMillan, former archdeacon of the Harrisburg Diocese, who resigned because of ill health. The Rev. Mr. Veitz is a graduate of the University of Pennsylvania and of the Philadelphia College of Divinity.
