

J. S. Aviators Await Transfer to American Forces at French Front

With the American Army in France, Feb. 8.—Nearly one hundred American aviators experienced in the Lafayette are impatiently awaiting their formal transfer to the American forces in accordance with the agreement between the two governments. Twelve of these men, who have seen at least two months' actual service at the front, were released by the French early in January, on the supposition that they soon would be commissioned in the American aviation section service.

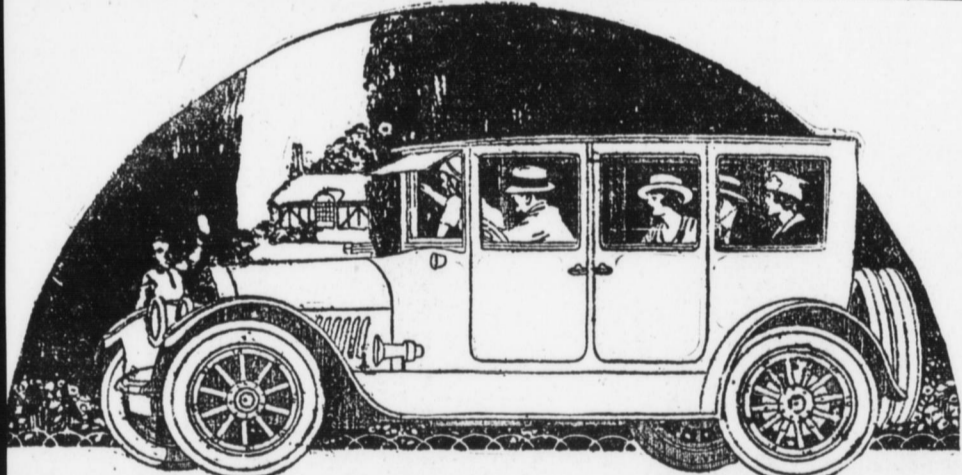

PRIVATE BANKS HAVE BIG ASSETS

Make Gain in a Year According to Commissioner Lafean's Summary To-day

Assets of the private bankers of Pennsylvania rose from \$5,241,965.27 at the close of 1916 to \$8,491,545.54 at the close of 1917 according to a summary of reports of such establishments furnished to-day by Commissioner Lafean.

Banking Daniel F. Lafean, Mr. Lafean reported 104 licenses in force against 105 the year before and fourteen exemptions, a decrease of one in a year. The revenue received for licenses was \$300 and two calls for statements were made.

The summary of the reports shows the total owned assets from \$2,320,387.91 to \$3,608,697.44 in a year, while bonds and stocks owned almost doubled. The increase in assets was general. The capital invested went from \$1,818,742.55 to \$2,183,320.70; surplus \$914,157.24 to \$1,523,065.51; individual deposits \$1,725,407.91 to \$2,910,206.33.

Sprout Invited—Senator William Sprout of the National Association of American Dairy, Food and Drug officials of which he is president, Dr. Randall succeeds Dr. David Kline who resigned to enter the Army.

Reading Hearings—The hearings in the protests against increase of fare by the Reading Transit and Light Company, from Berks and Lebanon counties were held at Reading yesterday, but not those from Montgomery. Commissioner Billing will have another sitting later.

Haynes to Be Named—Dr. Selden K. Haynes, of Kingston, is understood to have been informed that he will be named as chaplain of the second regiment of the Reserve Militia.

Smallpox Spreads—More smallpox is reported from the lumber camps of the Norwich section of McKean county and state inspectors have gotten busy to vaccinate the "lumber jacks."

Northern Central Payment—The Northern Central Railroad Company has paid the state \$131,000 as state tax.

Von Bergen Chairman—John Von Bergen, of Scranton, Lackawanna county commissioner, has been selected as chairman of the commission in charge of the prison farm in northeastern Pennsylvania. It is one of the first to get under way and it is going strong.

Put on Farms—Fourteen workers were placed on Pennsylvania farms during the week ending January 26, by the co-operative employment system maintained by the Bureau of Employment of the Department of Labor and Industry and the Department of Civilian Service and Labor of the State Public Safety Committee.

Carlisle, Pa., Feb. 9. — Charged with desertion, Roy Steckey, aged 21, a member of Company G, of the old Eighty Pennsylvania, and now with the 12th Regiment at Camp Hancock, Ga., was arrested here yesterday by Officers Snyder and Speck, of the local force, and last evening was taken to the Army Post, at Middletown. Steckey, it is claimed, was released from the camp two weeks ago, having been in hiding since that time. A reward of \$50 was offered for his capture.

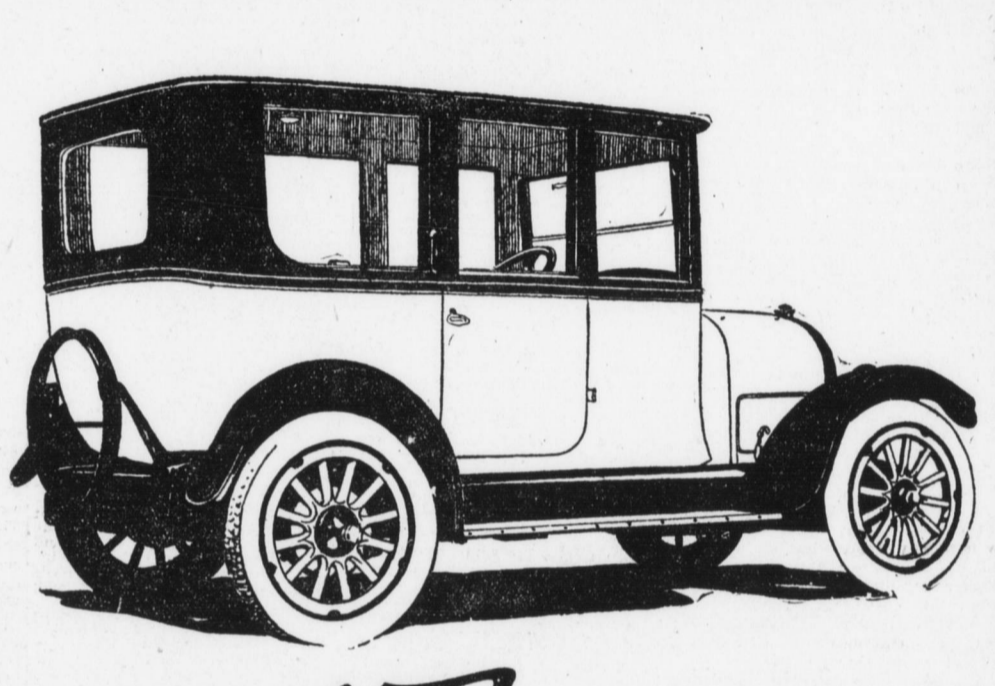
Townships Forfeit Money From Highway Department
