## New Soft Coal Price Fixed

Washington, D. C., Feb. 16.—Fuel Administrator Garfield announced last night that he had reclassified, effective to-day, certain coal-producing counties in the thin vein bituminous district of Pennsylvania and granted a price of \$2.60 a ton for run of mine, prepared sizes and slack. Only one price was named, as practically all of the 60,000,000 tens produced annually in that district is run of the mine.

Former prices in the district were \$2 for run of mine, \$2.25 for prepared sizes and \$1.75 for slack.
