Washington, D. C., Feb. 22.—The Senate yesterday defeated amendments to the railroad bill proposed by Senator Cummins, Republican, of Iowa, and Senator Johnston, Democrat, of South Dakota, both of which would have reduced the amount of compensation to the roads while under government control and would have removed the limitation of such control to a period of eighteen months after the war.

Trotsky is reported to have cast the deciding vote in favor of accepting a German peace. Written confirmation of the acceptance of German peace terms has passed the German lines, according to Berlin, which adds that this disposes of rumors that the Lenin-Trotsky government has fallen.

The men were charged with having beaten to death Anthony Novak on November 4.

Neutrals to Act on Loans to Russia

The Hague.—Holland has suggested to the other neutrals so Foreign Minister Louden has informed a Deputy, that they take joint action in respect to the reputation by the Bolsheviks of Russia's foreign loans. Spain, said the Minister, already has consented in principle and replies are expected soon from Switzerland and the Scandinavian countries.
