### **BERKSHIRE PIGS** FOR BREEDING

Pure-bred Berkshire breding pigs, are delivered when three or four months old, or before July 1, 1918, and are immunized and eligible for registration to the boys and girls throughout the state, at no cost, but are placed with them under a partnership agreement, which recites that whe nithe breeding pigs and their offspring are disposed of as pork or breeders, two-thirds of the proceeds will go to the boy or girl raising and caring for them, and one-third to the party furnishing the pigs. The partnership contemplates a two-year period, or until two litters have been raised. Full instructions, as to caring for feeding and breeding c2 the animal will be furnished through the superintendent of the company.

A proper number of pigs will be distributed in each town, sufficient to take care of the garbage of that locality, so that the only cost to the boy or girl will be, providing garbage enough to carry the pigs through to maturity.

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
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
