Fair Food Prices

The following statement, revised to February 26, regarding fair prices for food necessities, was issued to-day by the local Federal Food Administration.

Administration. Consumer prices are figured on a quotation "cash-and-carry" basis. Credit and delivery prices may be higher. The Federal Food Adminis-tration has no authority to fix prices. It may, however, determine what are fair prices, based on reason able profits to the wholesaler and re-tailer.
