Even Petrograd itself, which is still far distant, can no way decide the destiny of the revolution. The government of the People's Commissaries can, and, if need be, must retreat, must gather its forces and must appeal to the country to use its whole strength for the defense of the revolution. Should the threat to take Petrograd increase, the government will remove to Moscow or any other city of Russia.
