MANY ATTENDING U. E. CONFERENCE

Reading, Pa., March 1.-At the first day's session of the East Pennsylvania Conference of the United Evangelical Church, held in the First Church, in this city, hundreds of ministers and lay delegates crowded the auditorium yesterday. Bishop U. F. Swengel, of Harris-
