

MANY ATTENDING U. E. CONFERENCE

Sessions Draw Hundreds of Prominent Ministers and Laymen

Reading, Pa., March 1.—At the first day's session of the East Pennsylvania Conference of the United Evangelical Church, held in the First Church, in this city, hundreds of ministers and lay delegates crowded the auditorium yesterday. Bishop U. F. Swengel, of Harrisburg, is the presiding officer of the conference; Bishop W. H. Fouke, of Naperville, Ill.; the Rev. W. F. Hell, Allentown, presiding elder of the Harrisburg district; the Rev. F. E. Erdman, Allentown, presiding elder of the Allentown district; the Rev. A. M. Samsel, Reading, presiding elder of the Reading district, and other distinguished men of the church are present.

Prof. George W. Sanville, of Philadelphia, is the director of the singing, "Billy" Sunday's new song book, "Awakening Song," is being used. Yesterday afternoon the Rev. Dr. Worth M. Tippy, executive secretary of the commission of the church and social services of the Federal Council of Church of Christ in America, delivered an eloquent address. Last evening a rousing temperance meeting was held under the auspices of the Temperance Reform Alliance. The speaker was Congressman M. Clyde Kelly, of Pittsburgh, who delivered an address on the subject, "The Spirit of Brotherhood in 1918." The Ministerial and Lay Temperance Reform Alliance is composed of the following persons: President, the Rev. E. S. Woodring; vice-presidents, Allentown district, the Rev. C. D. Huber; Harrisburg district, the Rev. J. P. Gross; Reading district, the Rev. A. W. Cooper; secretary, the Rev. N. A. Barr; treasurer, the Rev. W. J. Schellley; lay representative, C. T. Davis.

At the opening session to-morrow morning a service will be held in memory of the members of the conference who died during the past year. In the afternoon the Rev. B. H. Niebel, of Penbrook, general secretary of the missionary society, will speak.

A rousing annual rally of the Keystone League of Christian Endeavor and Sunday School Federation will be held to-morrow evening.

The Rev. J. H. Stermer, of Allentown, is among the list of ministers having died during the past year. Seven applications to the ministry have been made to the conference. FARMERS MEET

The seriousness of the corn shortage was discussed, and the farmers were urged to raise as much as possible the coming growing season.

STAMP SALES INCREASE
The sale of Thrift Stamps and War Saving Certificates has almost doubled since the mail carriers and others started to sell the stamps. The announcement of a prize to the mail-carrier selling the highest number of stamps until December 31 has created much keen competition among the mailmen. To-day War Savings Certificates cost \$1.14. One cent will be added to the cost each month until they are worth \$5.00.

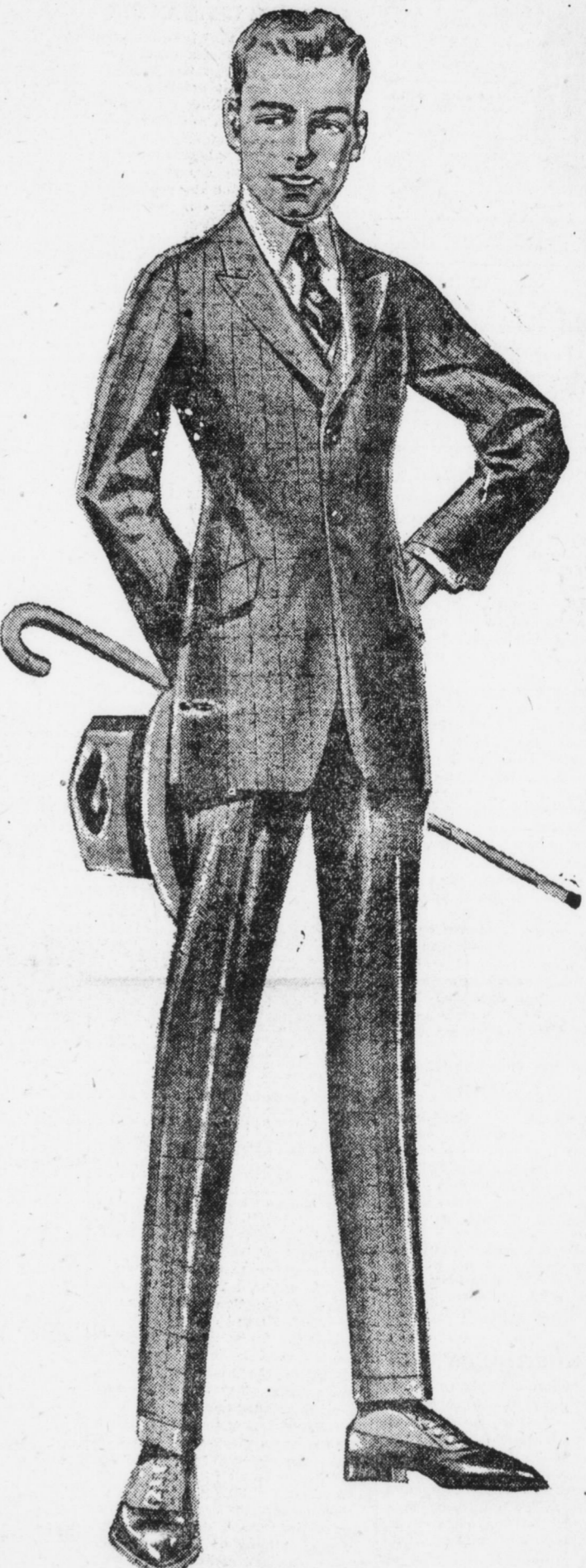
