Varied Trades Open Varied Trades Open
Fifty wireless tlegraph and telephone operators, and ordinary telegraph operators, are wanted for the aviation section. The men who enlist for these various phases of the aviation service will be sent immediately to Kelley Field, San Antonio, Texas, by their local draft boards.

At Ellington Field, Olcott, Tex.. 186 awning and canvas workers are needed at once. These men may be inducted by the local boards.

Twenty inspectors of gas masks or chemists, are needed to take up their duties in the medical corps. They will be assigned to duty in the Gas Defense Service at the Hero Manufacturing Company, Philadelphia. To qualify for this service the men must be college graduates with at least one year of commercial experience.

men must be conlege graduates with at least one year of commercial experience.

Must Be Qualified

Only white men, registered for the draft and qualified for general infantry service, will be accepted for these branches of the service. The local boards send the men to the training camps as soon as they are inducted and wire their inductions to the state headquarters in order that the required number are not overinducted.

A number of branches of the service heretofore open to the registrants have been closed. The Spruce Product Division, Aviation Section, and the Bricklayers' Division, aviation section, are no longer open to the draft registrants. Men who have already been inducted for this branch of the service, but not entrained, may be sent cut to the training camps, but further inductions will not be accepted from this date.


