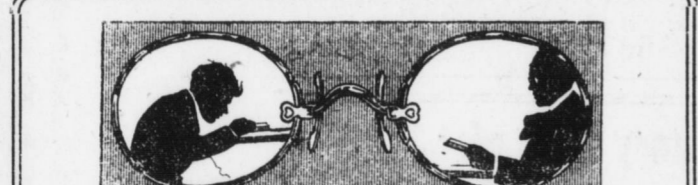
Pupils of Harrisburg Conservatory of Music Will Present Interesting Program
