Unusual Water Case—The Public Service Commission in deciding to-day in the complaint of James W. Cornish, an Erie county resident, against the Fairview Water Comagainst the Fairview Water Company, takes the position that a water company must pay for the meters and not require consumers to pay for them, but at the same time rules that because of heavy expenses on the company because of increase in population it may give consumers credit for meters already installed.
