PRESBYTERIAN CLERIC CALLS ON ADMINISTRATION TO STOP WASTING FOODSTUFFS IN BEER

Ministers Declare It's Folly to Wait Until Passage of Prohibition Amendment Before Saving Wheat

Not to wait for the passing of the prohibition amendment in Congress, but to immediately stop the use of grain foods in the manufacture of beer on account of the war, was the gist of a resolution drawn up last evening by the Presbyterian Cleric of Harrisburg and neighborhood and forwarded to-day to President Wilson. This gathering included pastors representing 29 churches with a total membership of 8,000. It was held at the Y. M. C. A. where a dinner was served with the Rev. Dr. Lewis S. Mudge, as host.

State to Place Orders For Farm Tractors, to Be Delivered at Once

Red Cross Aids Families of Men Called to War

The State Safety and Defense Commission at a special meeting held to-day at the Capitol, authorized an appropriation of \$50,000 for the purchase of tractors to be rented to farmers in need of farm labor by the State Department of Agriculture at as low rates as possible. The meeting was presided over by Lieutenant Governor McClain, and after a statement by Secretary of Agriculture Patton the money was granted. Messrs. McClain and Patton and M. G. Bushong, of the State Commission of Agriculture, being named as a committee to make the purchases.

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RED CROSS AIDS FAMILIES OF MEN CALLED TO WAR

Home Service Department Extends Loans in Time of Need

That sixty-nine families have been helped during the last month by the Home Service Department of the Harrisburg Chapter, American Red Cross, was the substance of a report made yesterday afternoon at a meeting of the chapter's executive committee. A total of \$3,400 was expended for financial relief and five soldiers, stranded here, because they lacked funds, were given money and sent on their way.

It is the practice of the Home Service Department to lend money to the families of soldiers when their families are found to be in need. The fund has been very encouraging. During the past month, \$400 was returned to the chapter from these loans.

Teacher of French has been secured for the instruction of the men at the Middletown camp, by the committee in charge of this camp's Red Cross work. Mrs. James Henry Darlington is chairman of the committee. She reported at yesterday's meeting that the men were enthusiastic over the new class, and that the commandant has warmly approved of their work.

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
