First Deputy Highway Commissioner Hunter presided at the opening of the state highway work at the Capitol to-day, when thirty-three miles of work were offered, but no awards made.

Reed Charges Gross Extravagance in Conduct of Food Administration

By Associated Press. Washington, March 12.—Charges of gross extravagance in the management of the affairs of the food administration were made in the Senate today by Senator Charles McNair, who demanded that Food Administrator Hoover give an accounting of the department's finances.

The charges were made after the Missouri Senator had asked that the appropriation of \$1,750,000 for the food and fuel administrations be eliminated from the Urgent Deficiency Bill.

Belgium Take Germans in Raid Near Dixmude

Paris, Monday, March 12.—"In a successful raid north of Dixmude, Belgium, the Belgians captured today a number of German tanks today," an official Belgian report.

Belgian planes enabled us to check two enemy attacks against our advanced posts, one north of Dixmude, the other in the direction of St. Georges. These failures prompted the enemy to open a heavy artillery bombardment of our positions, but our artillery held his batteries in check."

BIG BUSINESS MUST PAY MORE FOR WATER

[Continued from First Page.] The charge ranging from 3 1/4 to 8 cents, per thousand gallons. Three schedules are included in the report by Mr. Ledoux, which will be studied by Council at a special conference this evening. In each of the lists a charge is made for meter service, based on the size of the meter which is used. Allowance of 4 per cent interest on the equipment of the plant, 1 per cent depreciation, operating expenses, no free water service, and no charge for water used for fire service, are the charges on which Mr. Ledoux estimates that the total revenue should be \$22,770.

It is understood that recommendations are made in the report for various improvements and additions to the present equipment of the department. A general review of the present supply system is included also. The estimated value of all equipment is totaled at \$2,527,000, with operating expenses of \$294,200.

Under the schedules prepared by Mr. Ledoux the total income of the department would be about \$25,000 greater than last year's total, with the annual report of 1917, it was said.

Penny Stockholders Take Over Two Small Branches

Philadelphia, March 12.—The stockholders of the Pennsylvania railroad in annual session to-day authorized the directors of the company to enter into an agreement with the government for the control of the property during the period of the war. Another resolution adopted authorized an increase of \$75,000,000 in the indebtedness of the company.

The annual report of President Rea was approved and the absorption of Cornwall and Lebanon and the Susquehanna, Bloomsburg and Gettysburg railroads, branch lines, was ratified.

Council Prepares to Get Out Triennial Assessment

Preparations are being made to start work on the triennial assessment. Council to-day passed on first reading three ordinances providing for appointment of a draughtsman, four copyists and two assistant clerks for the office of City Assessor James C. Thompson. The draughtsman will be paid at the rate of \$1,200 annually; copyists, \$65 monthly and assistant clerks not more than \$125 monthly.

Old Country Club Ground to Be Made Gun Range

Officials of the Harrisburg Sportsmen's Association announced to-day that negotiations against the city for the lease of the Greenawald property, which has just been acquired by the city, are in progress. Plans were completed last night for an up-to-date clubhouse, trap facilities and for shooting contests of all kinds. It is said that when the new ground has been taken over and improvements finished, the local association will lease one of the finest trap-shooting grounds in Pennsylvania. With the admission to the city of the Greenawald property, the grounds now located at Second and Division streets must be vacated, as shooting is not permitted within the city limits.

Date Fixed For Hearing Grade Crossing Traps

The Public Service Commission today fixed April 10 as the date for hearing the complaint of the State highway department against the grade crossings in Perry township, including that of the Reading near Hummelstown, which has just been attacked by the Dauphin county grand jury because of the accident which occurred Saturday.

Baruch Made Supreme War Supply Chief

Bernard M. Baruch has been appointed by President Wilson as chairman of the War Industries Board. The board will have direct domination over food, railroads, shipping, munitions and, in fact, everything except the fixing of prices. Mr. Baruch, like Mr. Hoover and Dr. Garfield, will be the President's direct agent in the war supply field and have greater executive powers than any

MIDDLETOWN SITE HAS BEEN SELECTED

[Continued from First Page.] Department to proceed with the construction of warehouses at Middletown on property leased and ultimately purchased from the Keystone State Fair and Exposition Company. Just how extensive the development is to be, General Gooden said, but representatives of contractors who were in town to-day said that the warehouses contemplated will cover not less than 200 acres. General Goethals is careful to state that no such portions of the land as are unsuitable for warehouse purposes is to be taken over by the Government.

It was in the interest of placing these warehouses at Middletown that President Andrew J. Patterson and other representatives of the Harrisburg Chamber of Commerce visited Washington several weeks ago. They contended that the Middletown site was ample for the purposes of the Ordnance Department development and that there is plenty of land well suited to the purpose of being places in the county districts to enroll voters, making their returns on Thursday at the Commissioners' offices. Registration day in the city will be May 1.

At that time there was no thought of a quartermaster's depot for Harrisburg, at least so far as public notice had been given. But when this great development was announced it became apparent that the ground at Middletown would not be sufficient, and the committee entered the protest against the New Cumberland site, which it was recognized would be quite as advantageous for Harrisburg as that at Middletown.

Coffeeless Meals Face Careless Soldiers at Camp Hancock, Ga.

Camp Hancock, Ga.—Meals minus coffee for an indefinite period will be served at the new Pennsylvania soldiers' camp at Camp Hancock, Ga. It is considered unwise to wash mess kits in the beverage. Such was the opinion expressed in a memorandum issued yesterday from division headquarters which calls attention to the fact that the instructions of the War Department require that the mess kits be washed in coffee.

Back to Build Ordnance

Word reached Harrisburg this afternoon that James Black, at first recommended by the Ordnance Department, has been awarded contract for the erection of warehouses. Wells Brothers, of Chicago, will build the aviation depot. The Ordnance Department is looking about for quarters. The contract for the quartermaster's warehouses, which are to be built at New Cumberland, has not yet been let but will be in a few days. It is understood that the Ordnance Department will be started first and the construction of the erection of buildings at New Cumberland will be started in the next few days. The first work at both places will be the laying out of the necessary railroad yardage and connections and the Government agents to-day started men to work hiring for this purpose. It is understood that the Government will send more than 2,000 men here in a short time, as soon as the necessary temporary barracks have been erected for them. Some millions of feet of lumber have been ordered for this purpose, some of which already has been delivered.

Chinese Would Fight For Uncle Sam

Manila, P. I.—Over seventy Chinese have offered to serve in a company to be incorporated in the Philippine National Guard, in accordance with a movement planned by the Chinese community here and backed financially by the Cantonese Club. This company will be composed entirely of Chinese born either in the United States or its territories, and is being organized under the leadership of Chung Lim Cheng, who graduated from Chester Military Academy with the rank of captain. There seems to be no doubt that the company will be accepted as soon as it has been organized.

At the beginning of the feeding period the pigs will be weighed by the county agent and a member of the local committee. The pigs will be fed by the club members during the year, for a period of about 40 days. At the end of which will be held a "roundup day" when all the pigs will be brought together and judged by a competent judge and the prizes awarded.

The organization of these clubs will be continued this week and next when the county agent will present club work, illustrated by slides at the following places: Tuesday evening, Adam Smith school, near Carleton; Wednesday evening, Red Hill schoolhouse, near Dauphin; Thursday evening, Loyalton; Saturday evening at Killinger Grange Hall.

All boys and girls that come in the ages referred to are invited to attend one of these meetings. A local committee will be appointed in each community and a club leader to co-operate with the county agent.
