

26 Are Missing From British Ship Rathmore Following Collision

London, March 15.—Twenty-six persons are missing in consequence of a collision between a naval vessel and the British steamship Rathmore.

Survivors have been landed at Kingstown, Ireland, by destroyers.

The Rathmore, a vessel of 1,569 tons gross, owned in Dublin, was bound from Holyhead, Wales, across St. George's channel for Dublin.

There were 640 passengers on board. The collision occurred in midchannel. The Rathmore, badly damaged, was towed to Dublin.

"Our and the enemy's artillery showed some activity during the night southwest and west of Cambrai, south of Amantieres and in the Massiges and Menin road sectors."

HARDSCRABBLE LITIGATION MAY BE CLOSED SOON

Award of \$1,500 Against the Property of John A. McAlister Simplifies Matters

With the return of a verdict awarding the city \$1,500 as benefits against the property of John A. McAlister, the Hardscrabble proceedings have now reached a point where all litigation can be disposed of without further delay.

The jury verdict yesterday gave the city one-half the amount awarded by the viewers. Counsel for the property owners involved in the suit can now file a motion for judgment in favor of the defense, notwithstanding the verdict which has been returned for the city. If the court refuses the motion an appeal can be taken to the Appellate Courts. It is likely such a motion will be filed soon and the point in question will then be argued.

Judge S. J. M. McCarroll, who has been hearing the various suits, yesterday afternoon adjourned court after the verdict was returned. It is likely a date will be set later for hearing the remaining nine suits against property owners on the east side of the street.

All the legal points under debate in the proceedings to take over the west side properties have been argued and the cases are now under advisement by the court. As soon as an opinion is handed down it is believed an appeal will be taken.

It was said to-day the city will file a motion for a new trial in the case against Katie G. Raymond, in which the jury returned a verdict in favor of the defendant. The motion will be listed for hearing at the next session of argument court.

HELD AS SWINDLERS

John MacDonald and F. E. Hurlbert, two men who were picked up by the police Wednesday night on suspicion of being deserters from the Army, may face serious charges of using the United States uniform to defraud, Lieutenant Lesher, commander of the Regular Army Station here, said this morning when both men were in uniform, and claimed at first to be from Bangor, Maine, traveling on official business.

Subsequent investigation showed that the men are not known by authorities at the Army station which they claimed for their headquarters, and the police are taking fingerprint photographs to be sent to Washington for investigation. In case the men are not known by the military authorities at Washington, Lieutenant Lesher will make charges against them for masquerading in the uniform.

American Troops Hold Trenches Taken From Enemy; Huns Repulsed

With the American Army in France March 14.—10 p. m.—American troops in the Luneville sector have occupied and are holding enemy trenches northeast of Badonviller, which they forced the Germans to abandon through recent raids and concentrated artillery fire. The trenches have been consolidated with ours.

This, though a small forward movement marks the first permanent advance by the American Army in France. The consolidation of the trenches enables the Americans and French to operate from higher ground than heretofore.

The Germans made only feeble attempts to retake their position, but each time were repulsed.

Sale of English War Bonds Reach Big Total

London, Wednesday, March 13.—Andrew Bonar Law, chancellor of the exchequer, announced in the House of Commons to-day that the special effort last week to sell national war bonds throughout the country has resulted in subscriptions totaling 127,870,240 pounds sterling.

To this sum, he said, must be added 2,900,000 pounds sterling of the post office issue and \$100,000 pounds sterling in war savings certificates, making a grand total of 138,870,240 pounds sterling subscribed for the prosecution of the war.

The chancellor said that since October, when the issue of war bonds began, the total amount sold was 570,000,000 pounds sterling.

City Has Abundance of Food Staples at Reasonable Prices, New Survey Shows

An abundance of potatoes and cabbage reported from both produce dealers and local marketers featured the local food survey made by the Dauphin county food administration this morning. Not only is there an abundant supply, but prices are reasonable and the administration urges extensive use of these two commodities by all citizens.

More than 2,000,000 pounds of foodstuffs were reported in stock by wholesalers, while the retail stores, as usual, carry as much more.

The survey shows: Flour, 223,500 pounds; corn meal, 19,000 pounds; oat meal, 60,500 pounds; beans, 126,500 pounds; rice, 29,000 pounds; canned goods, 530,000 pounds; sugar, 42,900 pounds; meat, 1,040,000 pounds, and lard and lard substitutes, 19,000 pounds.

In addition to the large stock of flour in the hands of dealers and retailers, there has already been reported to the food administration more than 150,000 pounds held by households throughout the city and county in excess of a thirty-day supply.

Ships Requisitioned From Dutch Will Carry Food

Washington, March 15.—The million tons of Dutch ships about to be taken over by the United States and Great Britain by requisition if the Netherlands government voluntarily does not agree to turn them over will be used chiefly, officials said to-day, for the transportation of foodstuffs. Their use is expected to go far towards removing the danger of serious food shortages in the allied countries.

The ships will be pooled by the allied governments in the common cause. The Dutch crews are expected to remain with them.
