Russia Opens Peace **Negotiations With the** Ukrainians at Kiev

Amsterdam, Wednesday, March 13.—The opening of peace negotia-tions at Kiev between Russia and Ukraine is reported in a Vienna dispatch to the Vessische Zeitung of Berlin.

The Ukrainian Rada, the dispatch says, will meet soon to ratify the peace treaty with the Central Powers.

The government set up in Ukraine after its declaration of independence from Russia was opposed as Bourgeois by the Bolsheviki, who sent troops to support a Bolshevik movement in Ukraine. A number of battles were fought and Kiev was captured by the Bolsheviki. The terms imposed by the Central Powers in the peace treaty with Russiand the advance of Teutonic troops into Ukraine, however, compelled the Bolsheviki to give up their campaign.



I believe I had the satisfaction of being the first to build a bonfire. Presently the whole place was ablaze and it made it easier to do rescue work."
