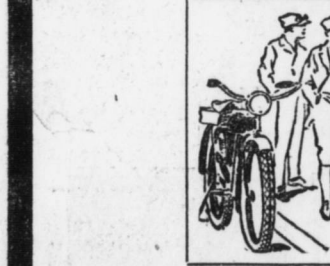

New York Legislature Reports Bill Out of Committee; May Not Pass

Albany, March 21.—For the first time in history of Legislative fights to legalize Sunday baseball, women from New York city appeared in force here to urge passage of the Lawson-Kiernan bill, which would permit amateur or professional baseball after 2 P. M. on Sunday.

As with practically every other piece of controversial legislation the war entered into the battle. Canon Chase of New York, a noted ecclesiastic, argued that while the war is on "there is not room for squabble over Sunday baseball."

Labor representatives, headed by James P. Holland, President of the State Federation of Labor, spoke in favor of the bill.

In an interesting basketball contest on the Boyd Memorial Hall floor last evening the Crescents won from the Penn Knights with a score of 35 to 17.

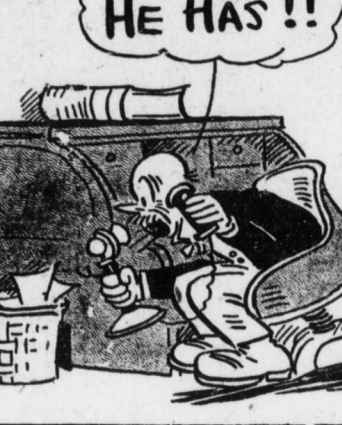
