ENROLLMENT IN COUNTY IS HEAVY

Republican Party Has Great Majority of Voters in Its Ranks

Returns from the registry assessors in all but one of the 12 county districts giving revised figures for the party enrollment of voters show that the Republican total is 13,177, a majority of 6,135 over the entire total of the Democratic, Socialist and no party choice registrants, indicating a sweeping majority for the dominant party of the state.

RAILROADS FIVE FREIGHT RATES

New Arrangements For Car- load Lots on Sidings in This City and Nearby

The Public Service Commission to-day announced that the Pennsylvania and Reading railroads had filed new joint switching tariffs applying to carload lots of coal, coke and iron ore, to become effective April 20, which will permit the delivery of carload freight on any and all sidings at a rate of 1.000 cubic feet of coal or coke, to be paid for at a charge somewhat lower than the combination of the local rates of both companies. The charges are to be paid and the new arrangement will apply only on carload traffic originating at points outside of the city or beyond limits of the stations mentioned and on which one of the carriers has received a road haul. The shipment must be reconsignee without having been broken bulk.

Cause Undetermined

As soon as the superintendent was told of the fire he rushed to the cellar with fire-extinguishers. He was able to extinguish the blaze after a much effort in the cellar, but it had already gained headway in the partitions. In the meantime an alarm was sent in and the firemen arrived. FOOD SUPPLIES INCREASE

Steadily increasing supplies of all commodities are shown in the weekly food census made to-day by the Dauphin County Food Administrator, who reports a total of more than 2,000 pounds of nine staple foods in the hands of wholesale dealers. Potatoes, exact totals of which are not to be secured, but which are estimated a more than 150,000 bushels, are the most plentiful of all foods, and consumers are urged to use them liberally.

Local Attacks by Germans Repulsed by French Forces

Paris, March 22.—Local attacks were made by the Germans at various points during the night, but they achieved no success, the war office announced. The enemy suffered considerable losses.

The statement adds: "During the naval engagement off Dunkirk on Wednesday night our coal and oil tankers were attacked by enemy warships. Along our whole front to-day the enemy directed a violent fire, employing gas shells, against our batteries, which responded vigorously. The result was a most artillery fighting, with the use of shells containing poisonous gas, was continued throughout the day. Our communications were bombarded violently."

Senator Jones Exonerates Government in Food and Fuel Shortage

Washington, March 22.—Speaking in defense of the food and fuel administrations in the Chamber of Commerce, Senator Jones, of New Mexico, exonerated both of blame for the recent sugar and coal shortages. He declared that the price fixing policy had saved the country from "chaos and confusion."

Senator Jones, who was a member of the manufacturers' subcommittee which investigated the sugar and coal shortages, spoke in reply to Senator Lodge, of Massachusetts, who recently denounced price-fixing as a failure, blamed the fuel scarcity on Administrator Garfield and asserted the sugar shortage was largely artificial.

\$50,000 For More Tractors on Farms

Fifty thousand dollars for the purchase of additional farm tractors to help the farmers of Pennsylvania in their spring plowing and other work to increase the food supply was placed at the disposal of the special committee headed by Lieutenant Governor McClain and in charge of the new tractor scheme for the defense Commission to-day. This action was taken following a report submitted by Secretary of Agriculture Patton in which he stated that the demands for the tractors were so numerous that more than the original forty would be needed. The board approved the appropriation of fifty thousand dollars for the first purchase and after considering Mr. Patton's statement the board decided to purchase the number to be bought was left to Mr. McClain's committee which is in touch with the situation. The commission to-day named two new farm advisors and directed that the whole concern for this service, but the commission continued it last year. D. H. Watts, Kernore, and Mrs. E. G. Benn, Williamsport, were added to the original list, which includes L. W. Lighty, J. P. Campbell, Dr. John A. Rosenberg, Franklin Menzies, Theodore Eitman, E. B. Dorsett, Charles G. McClain and Aldus Hartz. A report was received that the state had been able at a cost of \$1,546 to remove and destroy eight tons of abandoned dynamite near Pittsburgh. The owners had failed and the explosive was destroyed. Deputy Attorney General E. K. Trent was in charge of the arrangement.
