WAR ECONOMIES AT HOSPITAL Danville, Pa., March 22.—Many war economics are being put into use at the Danville State Hospital for the Insane, where 2,200 persons must be fed daily. By observing one meatless day, 1,100 pounds of meat are saved each week; bread, baked at the institution, is twenty-five per cent. 1ye flour; thirteen per cent. less coffee is used daily, and chicken has disappeared from the hospital menu. For some time past a campaign in light-saving among the employes has resulted in a marked reduction in the use of coal.


