

ADDRESSES IN CASUALTY LIST MENACE TO U. S.

Publication of Full Information Was Protested by the French Government

Washington, March 26.—An official statement of the War Department's reasons for announcing only the names of American troops killed or wounded in France, was submitted to the Senate today by Major General March, acting chief of staff.

General March said the old system of giving addresses and other details gave information to the enemy and brought swarms of claim agents to harass the relatives of the men.

The policy of the War Department, General March told the Senate, is to put in the hands of the nearest relative or the last friend given by the soldier in his emergency address, prompt and accurate information concerning the casualties before anything is given to the press and to prevent any information appearing in the papers which will be of any possible assistance to the German cause.

"The old system," General March added, "which gave the date of the casualty or the publication of the emergency address brought down upon the relatives a swarm of claim agents who guaranteed they would get from the government the war risk insurance which representatives by law to the proper inheritor.

"In spite of the fact that the department has in each case advised the nearest relatives that the government will be adjusted by the government and that they will be furnished the money that is due them without the intervention of claim agents, the interposition of these agents has yielded to the importunities of these agents and they have thereby deprived of a portion of what is justly their due.

"Information Chief Desire

"The raids which are being conducted along our front are for the purpose of enabling the Germans, if possible, with the object of obtaining from him information about the organization which is opposed to the German lines at this point. "The whole matter of a change in our former method in publishing casualty lists was brought up by a cablegram from General Pershing in which he stated that representatives of the French government had formally protested against the methods that were then used."

man sympathizers in Harrisburg and that the harmful rumors are emanating from them. In an effort to bring them out, the city authorities to their sources, W. H. Gaither today announced that large posters will be placed throughout the city and over the country, and that exaggerated reports and calling attention to the fact that when their reports are traced to their source, those responsible shall be reported to the proper authorities.

What Not to Believe

Some of the lies that are being circulated not only in Harrisburg, but over the country, are the story about the Red Cross and the selling of sweaters; that there are frequent suicides in cantonments, where men are compelled to pay for food brought in from the outside or starve to death; that steamships have been lost and thousands of our boys drowned; that the government is about to take over surplus food found in private houses; that the government proposes to confiscate money found in banks; that the war is over and that the government is answered by a statement coming from Washington to the effect that "the war will not end until the troops are given their whole strength in the fight."

Plan to Prosecute

The local committee asks the citizens to report any persons circulating false statements they do not have simply heresy evidence, because in the case of prosecution, this evidence would not be sustained in law, but that any reports that are made should be substantiated by two or more witnesses; therefore those who have information as to persons against propagandists, should communicate at once with the National Committee of Patriotic Societies, 929 Southern Building, Washington, D. C. This committee is getting in touch with the 2,000 local chairmen of the forty-four societies represented, and urging them to combat untruths by the dissemination of the truth. In a letter received by Mr. Gaither this morning from the authorities at Washington, the following is a part of it: "Those of us who cannot give our services should do their own part by seeing to it that our soldiers are not misled by the circulating of false statements. We have almost as dangerous an enemy to combat at home as we have across the seas. Thus far in this different campaign we have had comparatively few persons come out in open condemnation of disloyalty among our neighbors. The government alone cannot stop sedition. Literature and utterances; Every citizen must be particularly watchful for the insidious influence of these lies. It is through private conversations."
