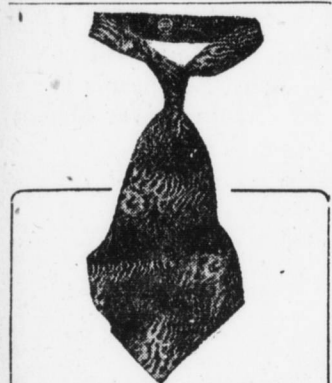
Mechanicsburg, Pa., March 29.—Patrons' Day, an annual event in the public schools of this place, was held yesterday and was unduly interesting.
