SOLDIER DIES AT HOSPITAL

Chambersburg, Pa., April 5.—Norris Singleton, of the tank squad at Camp Cook, Gettysburg, died at the Chambersburg Hospital, yesterday from pneumonia, aged 28 years. His wife from Chicago, and a brother, of Kansas City, were here when he died. The body will be taken to St. Louis for burial.

SCHOOL TEACHER RESIGNS

Carlisle, Pa., April 5.—Roy H. Bradley, instructor of the mechanical arts course at the Carlisle Indian school, and a family left here last evening for Salmon, Ore., where they will make their future home. Mr. Bradley has tendered his resignation here to accept a position as construction supervisor for the Indian Service. He came to Carlisle a little over two years ago when this new course was introduced and has been active at the school, heading several organizations and being manager of the 1918 baseball team.

PREMIUMS REDUCED

Carlisle, Pa., April 5.—A substantial reduction of the fire insurance premiums on dwellings and personal belongings here was announced today by the insurance committee of the Carlisle Chamber of Commerce. It is effective April 1, and will amount to a saving of about \$2,000 annually. In addition, a still further reduction may come through proceedings now pending for a re-rating of the town.

ASSAILANTS HELD FOR COURT

Carlisle, Pa., April 5.—Following a hearing, at which they presented no defense, Fred Estinger and Frank Stuart, charged with entering the home of H. G. Grandone here and assaulting Mrs. Grandone, later attacking Charles Lintner who came to her aid, were held for court under \$750 bail. The occurrence took place early in March but the hearing was postponed owing to the precarious condition of Lintner.

CHURCH DEDICATION SUNDAY

Carlisle, Pa., April 5.—Special dedicatory exercises will be held next Sunday at St. Peter's Lutheran Church, of the Upper Frankford township, at which the Rev. W. Wolfe, is pastor. A patriotic service will be combined with this and a service flag will be unveiled.

CURFEW LAW FOR COLUMBIA

Columbia, Pa., April 5.—Borough Council has passed on first reading an ordinance introduced by Councilman Dennis, which will be the curfew law on the books in the town. All persons under 16 years of age will be required to be off the streets after 8 o'clock from October until April, and before 9:30 o'clock from April until October each year. Council will take up the curfew ordinance on second reading at the next meeting and it will be passed.

MRS. JACOB HASSLER DIES

Hummelstown, Pa., April 5.—Mrs. Jacob Hassler, aged 63 years, of East High street, died Wednesday afternoon at 3 o'clock of dropsy, from which she had been ailing for several years. She was a life-long member of the United Brethren Church. Her husband survives. Funeral services will be held on Sunday, with burial at Wernersville.

U-BOATS FACING NEW FOE

Decrease in Sinkings Last Week Attributed to Improved Methods
Washington, April 5.—New methods of offense for destroying enemy submarines have been employed lately by the Allies and the American naval forces, promising excellent results, it was learned yesterday. The reduction in the sinkings caused by submarines last week was not attributed to the new devices and methods, but it was believed they had something to do with the decrease of losses.

TELLS OF WHEAT SUBSTITUTES

Corn meal, rolled oats and rice were the substitutes used last night by Miss Emma Stratton, of State College, in her baking demonstration at the Girls' Friendly Club, at Herr and Cameron streets. Bread was baked containing one-quarter substitutes; muffins and cakes used up the remaining cereals which one is required to buy with wheat flour. The demonstration was arranged by the Dauphin County Food Administration and is to be continued some weeks, exclusively in the foreign residents' districts.

WRECKERS LEAVE FOR VANCOUVER ISLAND

A British Columbia Port, April 5.—Wrecking and relief steamers left here today for the scene of yesterday's wreck of the Canadian Pacific railway steamer Tess, which was reported late last night to have been sunk without loss of life near Vancouver Island. The vessel struck a rock and sank shortly afterward, the reports said. The steamer, a steel passenger ship of 679 tons, operated for years between British Columbia and Southeastern Alaskan ports. She carried but few passengers at any time.
