

WEST SHORE WOMEN HOLD WAR MEETING

300 Register in Camp Hill District; 1,250 in Whole of Cumberland County

Camp Hill, April 6.—Three hundred women of the Camp Hill district of Cumberland county have registered for war work, out of a total of 1,250 in the county at large.

The meeting, over which Mrs. James W. Milhouse, of this place, presided, and a feature of the meeting were patriotic songs and a reading, "Jean Dupree," by Miss Bertha Zullinger, of Mt. Holly.

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Cumberland County Unit, under the direction of which the meeting was held, spoke on the need of popular education as to war aims and needs.

Enola, West Fairview, Washington Heights, Wormleysburg, Camp Hill, Lemoyne and New Cumberland were represented at the meeting.

Washington, April 6.—All other business was in abeyance in the senate yesterday for denunciation of disloyalty, sedition, German spies and the I. W. W. and discussion of how the espionage law should be extended so as to curb these evils and avoid a law without abridging the fundamental liberties of American citizens.

While the Senate debated the pending sedition bill, carrying severe penalties for disloyal utterances and attempts to obstruct the draft or Liberty Loans, President Wilson and the Cabinet gave attention to reports of the lynching of Robert Prager, a German, at Collinsville, Ill.

Members of the Cabinet said afterwards the deplorable incident emphasized the necessity for immediate legislation which would enable the Government to deal with disloyal and enemy agitation so that the people would not be tempted to take the law into their own hands.

Administration leaders in the Senate hope to pass the sedition bill today, the anniversary of America's entry into the war.

Senator Lodge, of Massachusetts, excoriating disloyalty, yet denouncing the proposed amendment, charged that the activity on the part of really dangerous people is being encouraged by the tenderness with which the Government is treating actual spies.

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COMMUNITY SONG ASSURED CITY IN THE NEAR FUTURE

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SENATE, STIRRED OVER LYNCHING, FIGHTS SEDITION

Administration Leaders Urge Law to End Temporizing With Traitors

The gravity of the situation growing out of the activities of German spies, saboteurs and sabotage workers increased measurably yesterday.

President Wilson and his Cabinet discussed at length the growth of mob violence, contained particularly in the Colfaxville, Ill., lynching of a supposed I. W. W. member.

The Senate gave up its whole session to angry debate on the sedition bill, providing heavy penalties for disloyal remarks and obstruction of Liberty Bond sales.

The conference report on a bill to punish sabotage was received by the House.

From Wisconsin it was announced that Victor Berger plans to make an address Sunday relative to his indictment for obstructing the draft.

Dr. Carl Muck, leader of the I. W. W. in Chicago, was ordered interned as an enemy alien.

In Youngstown, O., a plot was discovered against the life of Representative John Cooper, no longer in session.

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APPERSON WINS CLIMBING TEST

One of Several Motorcars to Climb Mill Creek Canyon Road, Near Los Angeles

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OLD TIMERS IN CADILLAC EMPLOY
