U. S. CASUALTIES TOTAL 447 MEN FOR APRIL 2 TO 8

Eighteen Killed in Action and 21 Are Captured; 344 Wounded

Washington, April 10.—Acting upon instructions from Secretary Baker, the War Department last night resumed publication of the daily list of casualties among the American expeditionary forces. Lists which had accumulated between April 2, when the practice was temporarily discontinued, and April 8 were made public, and it was stated officially that the casualties would be announced regularly hereafter.

Four hundred and forty-seven American soldiers were killed or wounded in action, of various causes or were captured by the enemy in the six-day period covered in the reports issued last night. The heaviest toll for a single day reported since the first American soldier landed in France was shown by the list of April 4, which contained 124 names.

Specified reference is made to twenty-one men having been captured by the Germans. Twenty of these were reported as missing and one previously reported dead. The combined lists show:

During the last week correspondence with the American forces has reported unusual activity by the Germans on the fronts where the number of casualties was reported. Dispatches of Sunday referring to the heavy artillery bombardment of the trenches held by General Pershing's men. A number of the casualties reported are believed to have occurred among the engineer units that took part in the great battle of Picardy.

STORM AFFECTS MARKET; ERIE PREFERRED GAINS

Trading Curtailed by Wire Service Interruption Responds Later by Upward Progress in Coppers and Shippings

Philadelphia, April 10.—Wheat—The most noteworthy feature at the dull opening of today's stock market was the fractional gain in Erie, pfd. issues, based upon possibilities of early dividends. Marine, pfd., Distillers and Sumatra embraced the other strong and active shares at gains of large fractions to 1 1/2 points. Liberty Bonds were irregular.

Trading was curtailed by the storm which interrupted private wire communication with the Middle West but upward progress was made later especially in coppers and shippings. Distillers increased its early advance and Corn Products and Enameling were added to the prominent specialties but rails and seasonal industrials showed little change. Liberty Bonds were steady, 4 1/2 to 4 3/4 at 95.04 to 95.16 and second 4 1/8 at 95.02 to 95.16.

Austro-Hungary Society Gives \$500 to Third Loan Philadelphia, April 10.—Today's subscriptions to the Third Liberty Loan here, which continued in large volume, included one \$500 from the Austro-Hungary Society, offering as one of the members expressed it, "evidence of the loyalty and devotion of the country of its adoption."

Among the heavy subscriptions received was one of \$48,200 from the United League. This amount headed a list of \$350,000 in contributions which have thus far purchased \$1,312,500 of the bonds.

Unfilled Orders For U. S. Steel 9,055,404 Tons New York, April 10.—Unfilled orders of the United States Steel Corporation on March 30 were 9,055,404 tons, according to the corporation's monthly statements issued today. This is a decrease of 50,000 tons compared with the orders on February 28.

Furloughs For Soldiers The State Commission of Agriculture, according to arrangements made to-day, will handle distribution of blanks for farm furloughs for drafted men. Army camps. The commission arranged to have a new survey of the seed corn conditions made and to take steps to increase the wheat acreage this fall.

Seven-Inch Fall in Locomotive Williamsport, Pa., April 10.—Seven inches of snow fell in Locomotion county during a storm which began yesterday and continued until noon today. It was the heaviest April snow in twenty-five years. In spite of the heavy fall, railroads, telephone and telegraph companies experienced little trouble.

French, who are now in their prepared positions. In his appeal to the House of Commons for more men, Premier Lloyd George declared that greater manpower was a grave necessity and that the more men at this juncture might bring about the decisive defeat of the German armies in the great battle on the Somme. The gravity of the situation was shown by the proposal to include Ireland under the British conscription act. The premier said the cabinet would soon introduce a home rule for Ireland bill. Much opposition was voiced to the Irish proposals and the premier was interrupted repeatedly by Irish members. The government's bill however, passed the first reading and the debating time on it has been extended to next Tuesday.

German Troops in Russia German troops, with the help of Finland and the Ukraine, continue to advance eastward into Russia. In Finland, Helsinki, the capital, is reported in danger of capture while in the south the German and Ukrainian forces have occupied Kharkov, four hundred miles south of Moscow. This is the furthest point east yet reached by the Germans.

Bolsheviki Accept Von Mirbach as Ambassador London, April 10.—The Bolshevik government according to an announcement in the Izvestia, forwarded by Reuters' London correspondent, has consented to the nomination of Count von Mirbach, former German minister to Greece, as German ambassador to Russia. Peace negotiations have been opened by the Russian government.

Mexican Troops March Opposite Fort Hancock El Paso, Tex., April 10.—A large body of Mexican troops believed to be Federals, was reported to be marching down the river opposite Fort Hancock late yesterday, according to reports received at district military headquarters here to-day. The troops were seen to be in progress on the Mexican side of the river yesterday.

Indiana Woman is Grandmother at 84 Terre Haute, Ind., April 10.—Mrs. Cook, of this city, believes she is the youngest grandmother in Indiana, a son having been born to her son when she is but 24.
