Washington, April 13.—"There is nothing in the military situation on the western front that should alarm the United States or Allied countries. Germany is making a supreme effort, but I have no fear that the Kaiser and Von Hindenburg will be able to seriously threaten the channel coast or that the Germans will go much farther in the Amiens sector."

HOLDEVERY POSITION TO THE DEATH, GEN. HAIG ORDERS

"Three weeks ago today the enemy began his terrific attacks against us on a fifty-mile front. His objects are to separate us from the French, to take the channel ports and destroy the British army."

Drive For Great Bases

Repulsed in their efforts to gain the Messines-Wyttschaete ridge, the Germans are putting most of their strength toward widening the salient south of Arrmentieres in an evident attempt to outflank the hill positions and gain important railroad centers. Baillieu is northwest of Arrmentieres and west of the Southern end of the Messines ridge. While Hazebrouck and Aire, toward which the Germans are endeavoring to push home their attacks are also important railway bases.
