Presses Action to Have Direct Information as to Turkey and Bulgaria

Washington, April 23.—The resolution introduced by Senator Brandegee, of Connecticut, calling on the Senate Foreign Relations Committee to give early consideration to a resolution proposed by Senator King, of Utah, providing for a declaration of war against Bulgaria and Turkey, was called up for consideration in the Senate today.

Senator Knox, of Pennsylvania, Republican, and former Secretary of State, offering a substitute for the resolution proposing that the President be requested if not incompatible with the public interest, to inform the Senate in their many reasons against declarations of war with Turkey and Bulgaria.

GERMAN NATION A LEPER, LOAN WORKERS TOLD

Time Has Come to Drive Taint From Nation, the Speaker Declares

Deputy Attorney General Keller at noon today brought the several hundred voters Liberty Loan bond sellers to their feet when, at the first of the get-together meetings of the home drivers, he declared that Germany is a pariah nation.

"Germany is a nation that is outcast," said Mr. Keller, "and it is our duty to drive it away from us; to ban it from our schools, from our newspapers, from our pulpits! And it is our duty here and now to promise that never so long as we live will we buy anything bearing the stamp 'Made in Germany'."

Today's meeting gave the Liberty Loan bond sellers an opportunity to see the workroom at the new Post office. In this huge place the war-time lunch of sandwiches and coffee was served the men who in the next three days will call Harrisburg in an effort to sell not less than \$3,500,000 worth of bonds and as much more as possible.

Deputy Attorney General Keller sounded the keynote for the workers today. "Every man in this room," he said, "if an epidemic or a pestilence were threatening would give the word."
