The greatest purse ever put up for a wrestling bout has been offered by Jack Curley and Louis Meyer, of this city. They are ready to give \$50,000 for a finish match between Earl Caddock, now the recognized champion, and the winner of the bout between Ed ("Strangler") Lewis and Joe Stecher, last night's show when they meet again.

Steglton has again displayed its patriotism in supporting war funds with the splendid success of the Third Liberty Loan campaign in this district, which closes officially today. Late this afternoon about \$625,000 had been subscribed, according to unofficial reports.

Although the campaign closes officially to-day, subscriptions can be made at the local banks until May 4, it was announced this morning. Subscriptions that are likely to be made during this period, together with the amount subscribed that has not yet been reported, officials hope to reach the \$700,000 mark. It is not likely that this district will double its quota as was the case in other drives, committeemen to-day said. Yesterday's report of the drive was to the effect that \$570,500 had been subscribed by 7,064 subscribers. Of this amount a large portion has been subscribed by steel plant employes. According to unofficial information, reports of \$50,000 in subscriptions made this morning by steel plant employes were filed by department superintendents.
