

It may, however, determine what are fair prices, based on reasonable profits to the wholesaler and retailer, if your retailer charges more on a "cash-and-carry" basis than the prices named below, report him by letter to the Federal Food Administration, Chamber of Commerce.

Historians Will Have Ceremonies on Famous Mountain Near Mercersburg

Mercersburg, Pa., May 3.—Plans ave been completed for the climb of the Pennsylvania Alpine Club, tomorrow morning on old Mt. Parnell, between Chambersburg and Mercersburg. A number of Harrisburgers who will accompany the party. who will accompany the party, reached Mercersburg this afternoon. They will spend the night at the Hotel Mercer, the homestead of President Buchanan, Pennsylvania's only occupant of the Presidential chair. Brief ceremonies and the reading of a paper on the top of the mountain will include the program on the heights. A light luncheon will be followed by the descent of the mountain.
