88 NAMES ON U.S. CASUALTY LIST; 26 DEAD

Two Lieutenants Die as Result of Accident; Another Missing

Washington, May 3.—The casualty list to-day contained eighty-eight names, divided as follows: Killed in action, eighteen; died of wounds, one; died of accident, two; died of disease, five; wounded severely, two; wounded slightly, fifty-eight; missing in action, two.

Heavy Supplies of All Foods Are Held in Warehouse. Heavy supplies of all foodstuffs are reported by wholesale dealers in Harrisburg to-day, according to the weekly food census of the principal commodities made by the Dauphin County Food Administration. As much more is in the hands of retail dealers. In detail the survey shows: Flour, 733,000 pounds; corn meal and flour, 134,000 pounds; oat meal and rolled oats, 31,000 pounds; beans, 167,000 pounds; rice, 22,000 pounds; canned goods and dried fruit, 635,000 pounds; sugar, 209,000 pounds; meat, 1,022,000 pounds; and lard and lard substitutes, 59,000 pounds.
