Bill to Efface I. W. W. Passes in the Senate

Washington, May 6.—The bill declaring Frank I. W. W. to be an enemy of the United States and authorizing the government to take any action against him which it may deem necessary, was passed today by the Senate after brief debate and went to the House.

Dillon's Voice Raised Against Conscription

COLORED TROOPS ON PARADE
