Philadelphia, May 17.—Competent political observers in Philadelphia are predicting the collapse of the O'Neil gubernatorial boom in this city. They base their forecasts on the open and growing sentiment in favor of Senator Sproul by the independent element and the gradual splitting up of the Vare support of the O'Neil candidacy.

Beidleman Is Assured of Coal Miners' Support

Scranton, Pa., May 17.—Senator Edward E. Beidleman, Republican candidate for lieutenant governor, who came here this week and was greeted by hundreds of prominent citizens, had another busy day. He went on an automobile tour through the northern end of the county as far as Carbondale and met many labor leaders, who greeted him warmly and assured him of their support. He was escorted by Alfred E. Connell and a committee of businessmen.

Before leaving the candidate expressed himself as being well pleased with the sentiment he encountered in Scranton and the Lackawanna Valley. "My friends in the coal region tell me that my candidacy has been well received and that the men who toil in and about the mines and on the railroads are supporting me to the limit. I am glad to hear news like that. Long before I thought of running for lieutenant governor, I regarded all the aid possible in securing the passage of legislation favored by organized labor," Senator Beidleman said.

Senator Beidleman Defends Mine Dockage Statute in Court

The constitutionality of the so-called "dockage act" passed by the 1913 legislature and signed by the governor may be at issue following the trial today before Judge Henry Sproull in the Dauphin county court of the case brought by James Beidleman and H. R. Kinsey, of Williamsport, against Susquehanna Coal Company. The suit seeks to recover the value of certain cars of coal which they were "dockaged" by the company because of alleged anthracite. The plaintiffs are represented by Senator E. E. Beidleman of Dauphin county, who has agreed to carry the case to the upper courts if the constitutionality of the "dockage act" is attacked. The law in question imposes a tax on miners in both anthracite and bituminous fields.

Berry Letter in Much Discussed Here

The letter of Bishop J. F. Berry regarding the candidates for Republican nominations was much discussed here today, especially on Capitol Hill. The bishop endorsed Sproull, O'Neil and Guffey regarding Lieutenant Governor, said that while Scott is not satisfactory to some he stands. Concerning a declaration of the Philadelphia Records says: "Up to the present, Scott has made no real contribution in favor of the national prohibition movement, but Bishop Berry is apparently satisfied with the promise of the Fourteenth Congressman that if elected, Scott will see it that the prohibition amendment shall have an absolute square deal, with good measure. Bishop Berry admits in his letter that he has not been identified with the temperance movement and that his record as a criminal lawyer makes him objectionable to some of our people." The bishop also states that, "although Scott's record is not satisfactory to some, the definite pledge he has given to safeguard the interests of the amendment, makes it clear that in the interests of ratification Mr. Scott, rather than Mr. Beidleman, should be nominated. Senator Beidleman has gone on record with announcement that he will be guided entirely by the election of State Senators at the fall election. In the majority of the twenty-eight Senators to be chosen are elected on a 'dry' platform, the Dauphin county candidate will secure the support of the measure, should there be a vote in the Senate."

REA URGES FOOD SAVINGS

Philadelphia, May 17.—With a view of welding together into a great food-saving army the 250,000 employees of the Pennsylvania railroad have been asked to join with their families and dependants, at least 1,000,000 persons—President Samuel Rea has issued a special appeal on the subject of food conservation to all the workers of the system. The most economical use of food and the avoidance of all waste by railroad men and their families are urged, both as a patriotic duty and as a necessary measure to avoid food scarcity at home. The message has been printed in pamphlet form, and a copy will be placed in the hands of every employee.

President May Speak to Confusion of Enemies; No Peace Feeling Here

Washington, May 17.—Either through a public address or a diplomatic note President Wilson in the near future may take occasion to comment upon a statement of the statesman made yesterday by Foreign Minister Balfour in the British House of Commons in connection with the Austrian peace proposals through Prince Sixtus of Bourbon. It was authoritatively stated yesterday that the American government fully reciprocates Mr. Balfour's expressions of confidence and regard, and has no intention of permitting machinations of the enemy to mar the perfect understanding which governs the relations between the United States and the entente. Moreover, there is no public sentiment in this country such as that which appears in some quarters, but advice English pacifist circles, holding it the duty of the government to consider any kind of a peace proposal that might be offered, regardless of the source of the probably mischievous proposal.

WAR CHEST IDEA HAS DRAWBACKS
