

President May Speak to Confusion of Enemies; No Peace Feeling Here

Washington, May 17. — Either through a public address or a diplomatic note President Wilson in the near future may take occasion to comment upon and supplement the statement made yesterday by Foreign Minister Balfour in the British House of Commons in connection with the Austrian peace feelers through Prince Sixtus of Bourbon. It was authoritatively stated yesterday that the American government fully reciprocates Mr. Balfour's expressions of confidence and regard, and has no intention of permitting machinations of the enemy to mar the perfect understanding which governs the relations between the United States and the entente. Moreover, there is no public sentiment in this country such as that which appears to exist in a small but avtice English pacifist circle, holding it the duty of the government to consider any kind of a peace proposal that may be made, regardless of the source of the probably mischievous purpose.
