WILL OPEN OLD IRON ORE MINE

Workings Near Gettysburg Contain Many Tons of High Grade Magnetic Rock

Gettysburg, Pa., May 20.—The old mine in the vicinity of McKnightstown and Cashtown, about seven miles from Gettysburg, which was worked in a crude way by the farmers of the community before the war, and not since, is to open again. An engineer who represents capitalists of Reading, who are back of the project is on the ground and has taken charge of the operations. He predicts a great future for the concern and the community. Several inspections of the place have been made and the product of the mine thoroughly tested and analyzed by experts. It is said the ore is of a high grade of magnetic ore, running from sixty-three to sixty-seven per cent, pure metallic iron. It is estimated that there is a deposit of at least one hundred million tons of this ore, and that it will take over fifty years to mine it at the rate of ten thousand tons a day. One large iron ore concern in Philadelphia is reported to be studying the matter to take every ton of it that can be mined up to a thousand a day, and they are anxious to get it owing to the war and the military material throughout the country.

Veteran Sacrifices Sight of Eye For Patriotism

Lewistown, Pa., May 20.—H. C. Estep, a veteran of the Civil War, shows patriotism in buying a Liberty Bond. He spent the two past winters at the Soldiers' National Home in Hampton, Va., where he had suffered an affliction, blinding him in the left eye. He was told that an operation by a Philadelphia specialist would restore his sight and he came to Philadelphia to see the specialist, while a meeting was in progress boosting the Third Liberty Loan. Hearing the words of the speakers, Mr. Estep came to the conclusion that he would do his bit and that one eye would serve him in life. So he went to a subscription booth and entered his name for a paid-up Liberty Bond, using the money that he had saved for eye treatment. Mr. Estep is now 72 years old and has an excellent track record. He has also presented a Liberty bond to the local chapter of the American Red Cross.
