WILL OPEN OLD **IRON ORE MINE**

Workings Near Gettysburg Contain Many Tons of High Grade Magnetic Rock

Gettysburg, Pa., May 20.-The old mine in the vicinity of McKnightstown and Cashtown, about seven
miles from Gettysburg, which was
worked in a very crude way by the
fumers of the community before
the war, and not since, is to open
again. An engineer who represents
capitalists of Reading, who are back
of the project, is on the ground and
has taken clarge of the operations.
He predicts a great future for the
concern and the community. Several
inspections of the place have been
made and the product of the mine
thoroughly tested and analyzed by
experts. It is said the ore is of a
high grade of magnetic ore, running
from sixty-three to sixty-seven per high grade of magnetic ore, running from sixty-three to sixty-seven per cent, pure metallic iron. It is estimated that there is a deposit of at least one hundred million tons of this fine ore, and that it will take over fifty years to mine it at the rate of ten thousand tons a day. One large iron ore concern in Philadelphia is ready to enter into a contract to take every ton of it this can. and they are anxious to get it owing to the general scarcity of the ma-terial throughout the country.


