Shunk, of Erie county, against the Buffalo and Lake Erie Traction Company because of its practice of charging five cents additional fare when the fare exceeds ten cents and a passenger boards a car without first purchasing a ticket, has been dismissed by the Public Service Commission with instructions to the company to provide an additional ticket office and have its ticket offices open from 6:30 A. M. to 7:30 P. M. daily except Sunday, while it must abolish the rule requiring excess certificates to be presented within ninely days. The commission comments on the case by saying there is no reason apparent why the same method of procedure as followed on steam railroads should not apply to an interurban railway from stations on its line where tickets are offered for sale.


